Mastin: Meeting is called to order. May we have a motion to approve the Orders of the Day? Darrell? Newkirk: So moved. Mastin: Pam? DelaBar: Second. Mastin: Thank you, Darrell. Thank you, Pam. Rachel, you have a list that I want you to read first and then I'll go around the room and ask for changes. Anger: Yes. To move to executive session is Agenda Item #8, International Division. Mastin: Darrell, is that correct? Newkirk: Just the discussion on the ID Banquet. Mastin: Thank you, Darrell. Newkirk: The report can be published as submitted, but I don't want the discussion in the minutes. Mastin: I agree. Anger: And then we have a Region 3 Club Application that we're moving into executive session. We have a New Business item that Carissa submitted regarding Cattery of Distinction to move to executive session. Then we have a new – this is a new issue, Kathy? – regarding show kitten name grace period, to add to

executive session at the end. In open session, we're adding a New Business item for Region 8, an in-conjunction show with TICA. Then, our CFA Attorney is going to discuss the importance of sending a delegate. Those two will be added to New Business. **Mastin:** That's correct. OK, Darrell? **Newkirk:** I would like to add an item in closed session. **Mastin:** What is that, Darrell? **Newkirk:** For the ID, and that's to discuss the show this past weekend where the show closed on Thursday, rather than Wednesday, and they took emailed entries and not online entries. I would like that discussed in closed session. **Mastin:** Can we tie that in right when you do the ID banquet, as well? **Newkirk:** Yes. **Mastin:** OK.

Mastin: Vicki? Jensen: Unless there is a reason, I think that #29 – Mastin: The Region 4 show scheduling objection? Jensen: Yeah. I think that should be an open session unless we're going to be talking about particular people. Mastin: OK. Kenny, did you request it in executive session? Currle: I did. Mastin: Do you want to keep it in executive session? Currle: I do. Mastin: OK Vicki, it will require a motion and it has to pass in order to move it into open session. Jensen: I'll move to. Mastin: I need a second. Newkirk: I'll second, for discussion. Mastin: OK. We have a motion, we have a second. Discussion? Vicki, go ahead. Why do you want to move it into open session? Jensen: Because unless we're talking about particular people or anything of that nature, it should properly be in open session. Mastin: OK. Rachel. Anger: My alternative suggestion would be to keep it in executive session and after the discussion we can determine if it truly was of a sensitive nature that we would want to keep there or move to open session. Jensen: That's fine. Yeah. Mastin: Any further discussion? Newkirk: She needs to withdraw her motion. Mastin: You're going to withdraw? Jensen: That's fine. Mastin: OK. Darrell, do you agree? Newkirk: Yes. Mastin: OK, motion is withdrawn.

#### Withdrawn.

Mastin: Howard did you have – what is it, #18? That is just the placeholder, correct?

Webster: Yes. Mastin: So we don't have to discuss it. Webster: No. Mastin: OK. It's just a placeholder. We do have to move in executive session Judging Program before Deliberations. That's in order so we have Karen and George for Deliberations and Protests, so they don't have to go in and out of the meeting. So, we're going to move Judging Program ahead of Deliberations in executive session. Vicki Nye, are you in the room? OK, so you know that now, assuming the board passes the Orders of the Day. Is there anything additional? Kenny? Currle: It's my obligation as Regional Director. It could be either in open or closed session, about an objection for show scheduling from a Region 7 club. Mastin: Where would you like it? You want it in executive or open? Currle: We can do it at the same time with #29. Mastin: OK, so you have a second objection for #29. Currle: I do. It has nothing to do with this #29. Mastin: OK, it's in addition to. Alright, do we have any other items for Orders of the Day? Darrell? Newkirk: We should approve the amended Orders of the Day. Mastin: OK. Any further discussion on the amended Orders of the Day? Any objections? Seeing no objection, the motion passes unanimously.

#### (2) <u>APPEAL HEARING.</u>

#### 25-027 CFA v. Howe Gao and Jiao Chen

Violation of CFA Show Rule 6.35.b. and CFA Const. Art. XV Sec. 4(f)

Mastin: We have the board cite in open session next, correct? Anger: Yes. Mastin: Allene, are they in the waiting room? Tartaglia: Yes, as well as George. So you want me to admit them? Mastin: Yes, go ahead. Raymond: Do we have both here? Both Howe and Jiao Chen? Tartaglia: I have Howe and a "TR". I'm not sure who that is. Raymond: It might be a translator. Tartaglia: Yes. Mastin: OK. CFA Legal Counsel Ed Raymond will handle the cite. 24-027. CFA v. Howe Gao and Jiao Chen. Let me know when they're in. Tartaglia: They are in. Hello, Mr. Gao. Can you hear me? [Side discussions regarding technical difficulties were not transcribed.] Mastin: Hello, Mr. Gao. Gao: Hello everyone. Mastin: Welcome to the board meeting. Gao: Thank you. Mastin: Howe, who else is — Tartaglia: Howe, is this your translator? Mastin: Mr. Gao, we need both parties to identify themselves. Gao: I am using AI to help me translate. Mastin: OK, thank you. Ed, please proceed. Gao: OK, I am good. I am from Shanghai China. Tartaglia: Thank you.

Raymond: One of the parties, Jiao Chen, had notified me that she would not be attending. She is the entry clerk that was involved in this matter. She did submit written materials which the board has in their online files. Mr. Gao submitted numerous materials, as well. Those are also available to the board in their pre-read materials. Mr. Gao, I don't want you to go over everything that was in your written submissions, but can you tell the board what happened in connection with this show? Gao: Yes, I can. Let me say it briefly. It was actually last season, the total of 10 cat shows were held before this cat show in March. All the matches [shows] went very smoothly. Nothing has ever been reported, but in this cat exhibition in March, our cat show was someone reported it. You can see from the evidence I submitted that the time of being reported happened to be, it was just a few days before the end of the registration for the cat show. I was the cat show manager. I will pay attention to the registration status because it was reported this time. So, I had to deal with the matter of being reported with the relevant departments. I have no way to pay attention to it personally, the matter of registration. So, when I find out there is a mistake in the registration, I made a mistake and that's me. I think the entry form came into my map of documents before the deadline. I think it is a valid registration on this like this, so I notified your safety department. I have added the section missing information. So, in this case, I think my mistake is that I didn't find these data missing in time. I didn't find that these data were only sent to the club and not to HR. I think this is just a mistake caused by an unexpected incident. The whole thing is actually like this because our game was reported as a maintenance manager worked hard to ensure the smooth progress of my kitten. I have to cooperate with government departments to complete some additional applications and procedures. So, missed the most timely discovery. There is a situation where data is missing and then I asked how to fill in the missing information when it was over. I think this is a mistake in my work. That's the whole thing. I don't know. Mind test. Can you understand the pro English? If we can understand what I want to say? **Raymond:** I think you made yourself very clear. I appreciate that. Just to confirm, do the missing entries that you believe were submitted prior to the closing date of the show, you did not send those to the entry clerk until sometime on Friday afternoon or evening. Is that correct? Gao: Yes, understand because after I went to handle this matter, took care of this

part of the work to someone else and then the poster of the competition clearly states, to sign up contestants must send email to club and to HR at the same time, but I later found out that the player [exhibitor] only sent the information to the club. This is what causes I am the only one who got it. You go and see why you didn't get it. **Raymond:** Thank you. I don't have any other questions. **Gao:** It was also I who caused it to be discovered later is the time to fill in the information. It's late. So I didn't listen just now.

Mastin: Do any board members have any questions? Mr. Gao, Miss Pam DelaBar has a question for you. Gao: I am here. DelaBar: Howe, as I understand, there was also another show on that same weekend. The Shenzhen show was the same weekend as your show. Gao: Yes, there is a game on the same weekend as mine. DelaBar: OK. Do you feel that there could have been any problems that came up because of the two shows being on the same weekend? Gao: I do not. I don't think there will be any problem with this because the game in Shenzhen has been closed very early registration channel. Mastin: Darrell? Newkirk: Howe, it's Darrell. You understand that – Gao: so for the players – Newkirk: Howe, you understand that it's against the show rules to enter shows with an email entry? Gao: I just did this matter by email. Actually it has a special premise. That's because China has implemented a – Newkirk: Howe, I understand that the emails were in a batch file sent to the club's email account – Gao: – and any name management regulation.

Mastin: Are there any further questions? Mr. Gao, do you have any further comments? Gao: I don't have any comments. I apologize for my mistakes in my work. Yes, because of my mistakes in work. Yes, exhibitors consideration and I apologize but it's just that my company made a mistake for some reason. I don't have a subjective one intentionally doing this thing. Raymond: Thank you, Mr. Gao. The board will deliberate in executive session later today and I will notify you through a letter by email within the next few days of the results of this hearing. Thank you for attending. Gao: OK, thank you. Thank you.

Everybody's out. OK, thank you Ed.

Mastin: I am taking the liberty to share with all of you the second and third paragraph of Show Rule 4.04 for ease of referencing. I have highlighted in yellow (imo), a very important change/addition that was made two or three years ago due to the board having approved a club to license a show with less than 30 days at the end of the season (this show was in the United States). As I recall that particular show (from two or three years ago) was held the last (or second to last) weekend of the year. As I recall the then referred to Point Manipulation Committee (later changed to Special Investigations Committee) strongly recommended the added/changed words I highlighted in yellow. My concern is there are show rules for a reason with some being more restrictive than others. When exceptions are made to the more restrictive rules there are potential for unintended consequence, also the potential for some to have very serious issues/concerns on fair play or foul play that could result in extremely dissatisfied participants and or uncomfortable and time consuming protest matters. Making exceptions for emergencies and minor changes due to changes with entry limits, ring sharing, facility obstacles, etc. minor changes are at most times reasonable request that the Executive Committee and Executive Board do grant from time to time. This request (also imo), is not an emergency and nor is it a minor change, and it goes against what the Board agreed to when approving the current show rule. Show Rule 4.04 2nd & 3rd Paragraph —

I assume that's why it was in closed session. DelaBar: I have no problem with the votes being open. Webb: I have no problem with the votes being open. DelaBar: I questioned why the amendment presentation should be in executive session, I do not believe we did that in previous years. As for the agility discussion, we used proper names and in discussion with show rule violations - proper use of executive session. But

the results (of both these items) were published in the meeting notes that were distributed. Neither vote was controversial. And I will be shown as a NO vote on agility as I wanted the penalty on timing to be 10%, not the 25% that was passed. <b>DelaBar:</b> Perhaps I am missing some information. Vicki - you made the motion to seal the votes. What was your rationale for doing so? And I do not understand why the election for DAL should have any into board decisions, unless this is CYA. <b>Jensen:</b> I'm not running for DAL so why would you think it's CYA? That makes no sense. The bylaw amendment goes to the delegates to vote on. In my opinion, having the information that I voted for it (or you, or any of you) places a personal endorsement and people may consider "it must be good" rather than decide it on its merits. We now have Show Rule about in conjunction shows and what needs to be included when requested. I don't see all required information included in the motion. So maybe Rachel wants to modify motion before someone seconds it. DelaBar: Pauli, I believe they have included the required information. The board adds the rest when approved. Personally I feel we should have continued the "investigation" into partnering with WCCF over a year ago. **Griswold:** Is WCCF a for profit organization and is that ok (legally) for us to legally partner to have a show? **Raymond:** What is being proposed is not CFA partnering with WCCF, but a CFA club being given permission to hold a show in conjunction with WCCF. I don't see legal problem for CFA. **Griswold:** Perfect Ed thank you.

**Altschul:** I just have one question, to avoid repeating a mistake in the past... Are any of those associated with WCCF show production those who have been suspended from CFA, in any fashion? **Mastin:** I will hold off a bit on calling the motion to allow time for someone to answer Carissa's question. **Webb:** To my knowledge the officers of WCCF have not been suspended from CFA. **Newkirk:** I am not aware of anyone suspended from CFA being connected to WCCF. **Altschul:** I meant specifically to this event; however if we feel confident that the show production team with the WCCF event does not include any bad actors from CFA, then this sounds like a great opportunity.

Altschul: This was apparently squashed by CO. I don't see how they need to be involved if people are willing to privately pay for the rosettes. Moyer: It seems to be the same issue I battled with the poster project being told I couldn't use the logo that was published for everybody to use. It's an "us" versus "them" mentality. I've seen it many times and I don't get it. Currle: I agree with Janet and Carissa. Our national winners cannot be honored too much. They carry our organization. How does it hurt our organization for others to be generous? Anger: This is a missed opportunity. We have many very capable volunteers who are literally begging to help with projects just like this, but we neither solicit them nor accept their offers of help. How many times have board members professed, "this is a volunteer association" when it is a convenient argument for whatever platform they are lobbying for, yet they do nothing to develop volunteerism itself. NW rosettes are a giant feel-good token that exhibitors have worked so hard to earn. Our constituents understand that some belt tightening exists, but this kind of oppression is what contributed to the situation in the first place. Let's celebrate, let's have fun and let's work together with people who offer to volunteer and/or donate. Please vote 100% yes for this motion.

Tartaglia: I believe this started by someone who requested that CFA distribute rosettes they were purchasing to the top cats in regions 1-9 (may have been 1-7) during CFA's awards ceremony. It was not to just a few friends who had their first National Win. At least not the request I received. Their request was denied due to the thought that the only awards, rosettes or otherwise, that should be given out in conjunction with the national awards banquet should be those provided by CFA. Beyond that would it be appropriate for an individual to hand out rosettes to a specific group of winners at any time during the Annual, even on their own, when CFA hadn't? If there were any individuals unhappy about not receiving a rosette this year from CFA, surely an individual handing out rosettes to a select group, leaving entire groups of winners out (national and breed), would cause mayhem and terrible ill will towards CFA. We've been advertising all along that no rosettes are awarded this year. It was mentioned in the letter to the winners and on the duplicate order form. Our current vendor, Centaur, contacted me about using the CFA logo for an individual who wanted to order a rosette on their own. This is standard practice for a vendor. Since it was voted to not provide rosettes this year, it seemed logical that there wouldn't be any National Award rosettes this year, regardless of who placed the order. Typically, only CFA orders rosettes/trophies for our awards. If someone wants to order a rosette from Centaur (the vendor we've used) or any vendor for that matter, we can provide permission if the Board desires and people can do this on their own. Some things to consider are will the individual be required to use the same design that CFA has used in the past or can they choose any design they want (more or less elaborate)? Can they choose any colors they like? Ideally, a vendor should contact CFA to verify the rosette being ordered has the correct wording and award, however, this may not happen which could result in rosettes ordered with invalid information. It was mentioned that CFA is missing a huge opportunity by not letting people who want to purchase a rosette through CFA do so at their own, personal cost. The rosettes CFA has purchased in the past, close to 600, requires a minimum 12-week lead time. The deadline to order a rosette to be received at the Annual would be at least by mid-March, well before the show season ends and awards are finalized.

#### (5) <u>CENTRAL OFFICE OPERATIONS.</u>

**Mastin:** Allene, please do Central Office Operations. **Tartaglia:** OK. Before I get to the printed report or the one you've seen, I'd like to mention that I received notice from the I-X Center on Tuesday that our show is definitely taking place. You've all heard that they are moving on to something bigger and better, possibly an Amazon data center, but they are honoring all their contracts, so we definitely will be having a show this year at the I-X Center, so I just wanted to mention that.

## **CENTRAL OFFICE GENERAL**

1-Part Paper Show Supply Savings: Starting with shows in August, regular, single copy paper is being sent to shows in place of the multi-copy, NCR paper. This should result in an approximate savings of \$16,000 per year. Not only is there the savings by using 1-part paper instead of 2 and 3-part paper, but shipping costs are significantly reduced due to the lighter weight of the show boxes without the NCR paper.

**Tartaglia:** I only have one item, and it is regarding – I mentioned about the one-part paper. We're ready for that. We've already been sending out show packages with one-part paper.

**Temporary Registration Number - Official Show Entry Count & Points:** At the February 2025 board meeting, the board set a policy starting in the 2025-2026 season that only a cat/kitten entered with a TRN whose TRN fee was paid by the end of the show will receive points earned at the show. Show rule 6.16 states a TRN will be issued upon receipt of the TRN fee. Technically, the unpaid TRN is not eligible for entry.

In light of the new rule requiring all cats/kittens to have a TRN or permanent registration number to enter a show (with the exception of Novice and HHP), should unpaid TRNs be included in the official show count?

**Proposed Board Motion:** A cat/kitten entered with a TRN will only be included in the official show count if the TRN is paid prior to the close of the show check-in at the show.

**Tartaglia:** The board motion that I'm proposing is regarding the temporary registration numbers, the official show entry count, and points. In February, we set a policy starting in this show season that only a cat/kitten entered with a TRN whose TRN fee was paid by the end of the show would receive points earned at the show. Show Rule 6.16 states that a TRN will be issued upon receipt of the TRN fee. Technically, the unpaid TRN is not eligible for entry, as you know. In light of the new rule requiring all cats and kittens to have a TRN or permanent registration number to enter a show, with the exception of the novice and HHP, should unpaid TRNs be included in the official show count is the question, and the board motion that we're proposing is that a cat/kitten entered with a TRN will only be included in the official show count if the TRN is paid prior to the close of the show, which would reinforce the policy from February. **Mastin:** Darrell? **Newkirk:** I'll make the motion. **Calhoun:** Kathy seconds.

**DelaBar:** TRNs are not supposed to be given out until they get the appropriate paperwork for the fee. Now, I'm getting to my question. Relax. How are we going to enforce this? Because most of the clubs I know from Europe send everything over, all the fees or whatever, are sent by the club. So, how are we going to enforce/make sure that that one or two TRNs was paid prior to us, you know, sending everything over? Well, how do we enforce it? Tartaglia: Let me respond. Mastin: OK. Tartaglia: Currently, at this time, someone can enter a show online, and if they don't have a registration number, they can check a box that says, I need a TRN. It immediately gives them a TRN. It's up to the entry clerk to collect the TRN fee, or the master clerk, whoever it is at the show, and all that paperwork is sent to the Central Office. It's very common that we get the paperwork, whether scanned or mailed, and then the fee comes in separate, and it usually includes the surcharge fee, the TRNs, all that. So, we can easily enforce this because we need all of that paperwork before we do the count. DelaBar: Point being, how do you know it was done before the close of the show? Tartaglia: We don't. All we know is when we receive the show documents. DelaBar: So, as for enforcement? Tartaglia: It's better than what we have. Altschul: Every show that I've ever attended, I had to pay my entry fee before the start of the show. Can we not just say that the TRN has to be paid with the entry fee? Because I don't know any club that really lets a person show their cat without paying their entry fee. So, the TRN fee should be coupled with the entry fee. You pay it all when you pay your entry fee, and then you get to show your cat. I think that would eliminate the problem of unpaid TRNs. It should all just be together. So, the entry clerk program needs to have a field for the TRN, so when you get your confirmation, here's your first entry fee, here's your TRN fee, you have to pay it all, or you can't come into the show and show your cat. Tartaglia: I think it's an education process, and you're correct. A lot of people pay the TRN fee at the time they pay the entry fee, because the entry clerk tells them, "you owe us this TRN fee", and they pay it. But that's not the case everywhere. So, what we're trying to do is have everybody comply and do the same thing. We don't know if somebody pays the TRN when they pay their entry fees. We don't know when people pay their entry fees. That's really up to the club to enforce that. So, what we're asking is that by the time we get the paperwork, just like with every other club, that everything is paid, that we don't have to go track down payment for a TRN fee, and if it's not paid by the time we get the documents in the office, it's not going to be included in the count. I mean, it's a process and once that starts to happen, I suspect that people will be paying their TRN fee, if it's important to them, before they leave the show. Mastin: Darrell? Newkirk: So I have a question about if they go onto eCats or the other alternate system to enter the show, and they click the box that they need a TRN, why isn't there a place for them to submit payment? Tartaglia: We can do that. It's a programming issue. We have to program that in. So, we can do that, but then that payment comes directly to the Central Office. Of course, then we have to let the club know, "hey, they paid this TRN fee." So, now we've got to communicate with the club when the TRN fee has been paid. So, we were looking for a more simplified process without having to do additional show programming, but if that's the desire – that a TRN fee be paid at the time a TRN number is issued – we can certainly look into that and get a program. Shouldn't be that difficult. Mastin: Alright, Darrell. Mastin: So, if we're going to not include those cats in the count, can we amend the motion to allow them to claim those points once it's paid and charge them a \$50 late fee like we do? **Tartaglia:** I think whatever that show rule is, there's a certain time frame that that can be done. Well, the issue is, we score the show, we do the count at that time. So, if they're not included in the count, if they claim their points with that \$50, I think it's 30 days or whatever it is, we can't change the count at that time. They can claim their points,

but we can't change the count. That wouldn't be correct. Jensen: So, my question, I think that Carissa's idea would correct the problem that could come up with not so much the cat's exhibitor, but if the cat's not showing in the count and we don't know if the cat's going to be in the count, it creates a problem for the other exhibitors. They won't know if their cat granded. People that are running a cat or whatever won't know what their points are from that show until 30 days after. I mean, it's if they pay it at the time that they enter, then there's not a problem. Then we're not having to sit there and go back and look and see, did that cat count or not? And I know it might be one cat, but nationals have been won and lost over half a point. Tartaglia: There's a count at the show, which is the unofficial show count, and then there's the official show count. There's almost always a difference and that's why we recommend to people, if you think you got a grand by one point, you may be mistaken. It's happened, where people end up not granding a cat because the official show count was different. The 30 day that Darrell was talking about, that would have to do with claiming points. What we're talking about is that we would have all the information and the payment for TRNs at the time the official show count is developed. So, you never really know at the show what the count is, what the official show count is, because so many things can change. Mastin: Vicki, are you done? Jensen: I just think it would be cleaner to, like Darrell and Carissa said, have a box, have them pay it at the time that they submit the request for the TRN and then if the cat's in a ring, it's going to count and then there's no second guessing whether or not it counted. Mastin: Rachel? Anger: Thank you. My comment was similar to Vicki's. Regardless of official count or non-official count, at the end of the day, the person being targeted for punishment, if you will, is the wrong person. If I'm showing at a show and Ed's cat has a TRN and something happens and it gets removed from the count, I'm the one that suffers. That's not fair. So, there's got to be a different solution besides removing the cat from the count. Mastin: Kathy? Calhoun: I wanted to comment on the ability for CFA to accept the TRNs at the Central Office and the programming required for that. Programming required for this is not included in this year's budget. We don't know what it is. We can make assumptions, but we don't know what it would be, and we don't have a timeline, we don't know how long it will take. So, I would recommend that if we need to make a decision today, that we make a decision that does not include or require programming, and if down the road, we want to have a small project around what those costs are, build it into next year's budget. Mastin: Pauli? Huhtaniemi: Most of the European clubs have done what Clarissa said, about 10 years. It's working perfectly there. So, I don't see a problem that TRN needs to be paid at the same time with the entry fees.

Mastin: Carissa? Altschul: I think we have two options. We have one that we can do through the show rules where we just import the TRN must be paid with the show entry, and that doesn't require any programming or budgeting. It's just a show rule change. And then we could look into having a hard stop in the entry clerk form or entering the show form that if you click on "I need a TRN", there could be a hard stop. If you don't pay, your entry does not get sent to the show, but that would be a programming issue. So, I think we might want to amend the motion to add this into the show rules that a TRN must be paid at time of entry, like what Europe is already doing, but that will put it across the board, because I think some clubs have more of a problem with TRNs than others. We just have one show rule that covers everything. Mastin: Carissa, since you are referring to the show rules, I am going to call on Ed out of order. Ed, go ahead and address that. Raymond: The show rule already provides that the fee application form and pedigree must be provided to the master clerk, rather than the close of check-in for the show. So, it's already in the show rules. It's an enforcement. DelaBar: I'm just going to say, all of this

extra programming is above and beyond what we're looking at for the motion. I have no problems of us addressing the motion as written. Mastin: Pauli. Huhtaniemi: Ed already said what I was planning to say. Newkirk: I just want to make one point. This year, I have asked Cathy Dunham to send me the marked master clerk catalogs for all ID shows and one of the shows that stood out to me was a small kitten count. There were two CFA-registered kittens. All the rest had TRN numbers. So, we're going to see a bump I think in income from TRN registrations. Kathy, you're probably seeing that already, because people want to show their cats and they're applying for these TRN numbers. Mastin: Any other questions at this time? Ed, when you referred to the show rule, did you read the entire show rule? **Raymond:** No, it's a very long show rule. This is a sentence out of Show Rule 6.16. Mastin: So, as to this proposed motion, does it comply with the current show rule? **Raymond:** Since Central Office has no way to know whether the fee was paid to the master clerk before the close of check-in, they only can rely on, is it in the packet when it arrives at Central Office at the close of the show. So, technically, they don't line up but practically, I think this is probably the best we can do. Mastin: Or change the show rules. Raymond: Or change the show rules to provide that the fee must be included in the show packet by the master clerk. We can do that for a proposal. Mastin: OK. Janet? Moyer: Couldn't we just amend this motion to say that it would be paid prior to the close? Because all entries – I mean, prior to the show, all entries are paid prior to the show. The only ones that would be unpaid are absentees. That would be the only TRN that would slip through and they wouldn't have been there anyway. DelaBar: I was going to say, but we can't enforce that and that's why I said we should stick to the original motion. Mastin: Darrell? **Newkirk:** I just think that this gives us some teeth to make sure. Maybe the show rule needs to be jimmy rigged a little bit to include this, but this is a good start and we'll also have a few months to see before October if the implementation of the show rule is working. Allene will be able to report to you guys in October whether – I'm telling you something. You take their points away once or twice, the word will get out and it won't happen again, I can tell you right now. Mastin: Kathy? Calhoun: I think that, to echo what Janet just said, all other fees have to be paid prior to. Why are we making this difficult? I mean, it just, why don't we get, you know, all fees, entry fees, TRN, all this, why don't we just make it at the beginning? Just a simplification that all rules read similarly. So, my concern, and I had this conversation last night after dinner is, I don't like the idea that we have a show rule that isn't the same as what Central Office is following. This whole discussion is in open session and it will be printed as open session. If Central Office has a different policy than what's in the show rule, people already know that they can pay by the close of the show and their entry should be counted. But the show rule says it needs to be paid at the time of check-in. So, I have a concern that it's not consistent. Now, it may not be an issue, but it could be an issue. Mastin: Vicki? Jensen: Well, the clubs require you to pay for your extra half cage and your groom space before you step in there. This shouldn't be any harder. Mastin: OK, thank you. Darrell. Newkirk: So, if the people that are applying for these TRNs abided by our show rules, this wouldn't be an issue. Mastin: Correct. Newkirk: So, there's no recourse for Central Office. So, what we're doing is temporarily giving them a recourse to collect those fees. We're losing money when they don't pay those fees. Ed read the show rule. They're supposed to do it before the show opens. So, I mean, there's no way to know if it was done before the show opens or if it was done when the show was closed that they've submitted their pedigree and their fee to the master clerk. So, maybe the entry confirmations should have a little blurb added to them that if your TRN fee is not paid, then your points aren't going to count. Mastin: Darrell, I don't disagree with you. If we're going to implement this, we should change the show rule.

That's all I'm saying. Make it the same. Otherwise, follow the show rules. Now, for Central Office, the only way they're going to know that it wasn't paid on time is if the master clerks follow the show rule. If they don't follow the show rule and say, "well, Central Office has got a different policy, just pay me now. You know, the show's not over. I'll submit it." I just don't like the idea of having two different procedures, policies in place. Go ahead. Continue. We're having a conversation. Newkirk: So, the only alternative is for Central Office to collect a batch of these per month and send them to the board and say, "these were not paid, don't score them." I mean, that would screw up the scoring. I understand that's probably not a good option, but I'm just saying that something has to be done. Mastin: Right. Allene? Tartaglia: So, what we're asking, if the show rules say if the TRN fee is unpaid, it's ineligible for entry. I believe the show rules currently say that, correct? Mastin: I don't think so. Tartaglia: In a roundabout way. Mastin: It just won't be included in the count. Ed, would you read it? Raymond: The fee, application form, and pedigree (or CFA registration numbers, if applicable) must be provided to the master clerk no later than the close of check-in for the show and these will be provided to Central Office in the show package. The show rule needs some work, to be honest with you, because if you're going to say it has to be paid in advance and it isn't, and therefore the cat gets absenteed, what if the owner goes to the master clerk and pays after [inaudible]? Can that cat now go into subsequent rings with the TRN? That's not logical, so I think we need to flesh out the entire scenario. That can happen before October. I want to just pass this now as a stopgap measure. Mastin: Marilee, I'll call you after Carissa. Carissa? Altschul: I think the bigger concern why several of us are talking to this is, we're not so concerned about the person's points who has the TRN who doesn't pay. The bigger concern is, we're talking about changing the count and for some shows that would be significant. For some shows it would not be so significant, but if an exhibitor is at a show and they're provided with an unofficial count, the exhibitor has the expectation that count is pretty close to what's going to be the official count. They know it may vary by one or two. So, if an exhibitor thinks that their cat granded or achieved a certain goal and then they find later that they didn't achieve that goal, I think it's kind of unfairly punishing some of our exhibitors. I think that's where the bigger concern is here. I'm looking at the show rule. It's very long. It doesn't say what happens if it's not paid at check-in. It just gives a long explanation of how long it's good for and if it competes in the wrong class. But I think before we necessarily take action on this today, we need to come up with a way where we're not unfairly punishing people who paid for their entries and competed fairly at the show. Mastin: Marilee? Griswold: I guess I'm missing something. If I have a regularly registered CFA cat, I enter it in the show and I don't pay my entry fee. When I come to check-in, they have my catalog with some number on it that I owe them or they're not going to give me my catalog. Why is this not happening with TRNs? They just won't let you in the front door. Mastin: Allene? Tartaglia: Two comments. One is, not everyone does it the same way. And the second is, we might want to consider moving this to closed session for the discussion before we – Mastin: Can you say why? **Tartaglia:** It's not a widespread problem. Those of you who are expressing the concerns about the count, it's not happening at your shows. Mastin: OK, Kathy? Calhoun: So, I am supporting collecting the TRN fee at the beginning of the show with all the other fees that we have outstanding who participate in the show. What I don't want to see is someone get a TRN number, they go through the whole show, the kitty doesn't do anything, they don't pay the TRN. That is not fair. So if you do it, you pay in advance. It's either in the account and in the show or it isn't.

**Mastin:** OK, what are we doing with this motion? Darrell, you made it. Kathy, you seconded it, right? Or Kenny? Currle: No, I didn't second it. Anger: Kathy did. Mastin: OK, thank you. Kenny? Currle: Yeah, I just wanted to ask Darrell if he'd table this until executive session. Mastin: Allene? Tartaglia: We could also bring it back in August. At that point, we will know what the programming cost is to have a TRN paid at the time of entry, at the time they obtain a TRN number. We can find out at that point what the programming cost is. Mastin: Darrell? Newkirk: I don't understand why we have a show rule that they have to pay to get in the show. Why should we go out to the expense to reprogram to recover these fees? We should be jerking their ass in front of the board and penalizing them. If you don't do it, then you don't get in the show. I think what we need to do – and I have created, for the ID anyway, for the entry clerks, an I/O group, and I will be on there, and I will instruct them. "You must collect the TRN fee and the paperwork in order for them to enter the show." That's one thing that I can do to help for the ID clubs, and I think that's where the problem is, is in the ID. Mastin: Pauli? **Huhtaniemi:** Well, the rule says that you need to send to pedigree or the parents' registration number form and pay the fee before you can get the TRN. So, there shouldn't be any unpaid TRNs. It's the club's responsibility to check that the fee has been paid, and after that you issue the TRN. So, if there is TRN listed, the club needs to pay that. Mastin: Darrell, this is your motion. Newkirk: I'm sticking with the motion. Mastin: Kathy, you seconded the motion. Calhoun: With the option to vote no. Mastin: OK, further discussion? OK, I'm going to call for the vote. Newkirk: Can Allene read the motion, so everybody knows exactly what the motion is? **Tartaglia:** The motion is, A cat/kitten entered with a TRN will only be included in the official show count if the TRN is paid prior to the close of the show. Mastin: Kathy? Calhoun: And the only thing that I would ask, back to the fact that you can't participate in the whole show without a paid TRN, that this happened at the beginning of the show, with consistent wording as to how it is, that not at the end, not after you participated in the show, and you are part of the count, you eliminate this whole thing if you have to do it at the beginning of the show. Is this enforceable? We need some help, but it should be like anything else. If you want to play, you have to pay.

Mastin: Carol? Krzanowski: I think that the motion should be revised to say that the fee has to be paid at the beginning of the show. And I also believe we can work on a show rule for October that states the TRN fee must be paid for an entry to be accepted into a show. Then they will have a TRN number just like a kitten or any other cat would have to have a registration number. Mastin: Pam? DelaBar: Perhaps it would be best to say for the motion, A cat kitten entered with a TRN will only be included in the official show count if the TRN is paid prior to the close of entry of the show. Mastin: Rachel? Anger: Actually, when we received the report from Central Office, I emailed Allene to ask for a clarification whether it was the close of the entry of the show or the end of the show. I've never had a TRN. I think this is a problem with most of us that have never shown a cat with a TRN. We don't really get the whole process. So, for me to have "prior to the close of entry of the show", just like any other cat that's entering the show would have to pay their entry fees, this cat should have to pay. DelaBar: That's basically what this does, like I just said. Mastin: Ed? Raymond: I would suggest if you want to make this concord with the show rule that you make it that the entry must be paid by the close of check-in. The second thing I would mention is that this fee is a little different than an entry fee or an extra space fee. Those monies all go to the club. This is a pass-through, so the clubs are not particularly incented to do this. It might be worth asking Central Office to send out a mailing to all of the club secretaries, reminding them that their clubs need to collect this fee prior to checkin. Mastin: Doreann? Nasin: I was trying to figure out how to word this, but what I was thinking

is that maybe CFA Central Office could actually send a detailed bill to the clubs after the show and then give them a short like 48-hour or they could send a check with the show package for the money for the TRNs. Mastin: Pauli. Huhtaniemi: Ed already said what I was going to say. Tartaglia: The process we have is working for the majority of the clubs. We don't send an invoice. They know what they need to pay us, and there are times we do have to follow up and say, "you need to pay us this." It is very infrequent, so to do what you are asking or requesting, that would just introduce a whole other level. Mastin: I'm going to call on Rachel, then Kathy, and then go back to Darrell to confirm what his motion is. Rachel? Anger: I would like permission to ask Cathy Dunham if she could weigh in on if we were to amend the show rule as Ed suggested to read "prior to the close of check-in," as an entry clerk, is that going to complicate things or make things easier? Mastin: Cathy, come on up. Welcome to the meeting. **Dunham:** Thank you. No, what Ed is suggesting is probably the appropriate thing to do. As an entry clerk, I have control of how entry fees are presented to an exhibitor in their confirmation. So, it is very easy to add an additional fee that says \$25 or \$48 or whatever the particular TRN involves. But, by close of check-in is more appropriate than what Pam had suggested because some entries are not paid until they get to the show, so we don't want to interfere with that process, but by closing check-in is very appropriate. Anger: That would make it consistent with all other entries in the show. Dunham: Correct. Anger: Can I move that we amend the motion? I don't know if Pam had actually made a motion to amend it. Mastin: I will come back to Darrell. Kathy? Calhoun: I withdraw. Allene already covered it. Mastin: Darrell? Newkirk: I agree with the motion to amend, to what Ed said. Mastin: OK, so Allene, read the amended motion so we all know what it is. **Tartaglia:** A cat/kitten entered with a TRN will only be included in the official show count if the TRN is paid by the close of check-in at the show. Mastin: Darrell, are you good with that? Newkirk: I am good with that. Mastin: Kathy, are you good with that? Calhoun: I am good with that. Mastin: Is there any further discussion? Any objections? Seeing no objection, the motion passes unanimously.

# The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

**Tartaglia:** Thank you, everyone. **Mastin:** Thank you, Allene. **Newkirk:** Send me a copy of that and I will get it to the entry clerks.

#### **Current Happenings**

eCat Online Show Entry: The show entry deadline has been programmed to automatically close entries for both exhibitors and entry clerks based on show location.

**Year-End Awards Process**: The new system allowed us to process the 2024-2025 Region 1-9 awards separately from the ID/China awards. This meant there was no delay in releasing the files to the regions while ID show issues were resolved. The whole process ran very smoothly and fast this year.

*Entry Clerk Program*: The entry clerk program was updated to require registration or TRN numbers for kitten entries.

Genetics: The goal of this project was to perform color validations on cats being submitted through eCat. We are integrating the genetics logic into the administrative side of eCat in July. This will give staff additional validation checks on the cats being registered.

2025 eCat Projects: These are new items that have been placed in the 2025-2026 budget.

**CatTrack Follow-up:** Automation to send reminders to individuals and breeders to complete unsubmitted CatTrack cat applications and unpaid shopping cart items.

**Subscription Service:** This program will be applied to recurring services and will allow eCat users to opt-in to automatic renewals. This will immediately apply to ePoints subscriptions and later applied to any other similar services developed.

**Microchip Recording:** Microchip numbers can be recorded to a cat's record and anticipated to be in place by August. The number can be included on the cat's registration, the subject for a pedigree (not all generations), and other items as required.

My Files: This will be an enhancement to the current eCat system which will allow users to store pictures and files for each cat such as vet records, contract, DNA test, Microchip certificate, etc. There will be a base (free) service included in eCat with limited storage and then paid tier levels that offer additional storage. This model closely follows many of the "cloud" storage types of services.

**Electronic Show Data:** New application to capture Finals and Breed sheet data at the show by the Master Clerk. Data is then compiled into a file that allows Central Office to import the data into the scoring system.

**Mastin:** James, you have IT System Optimization. **Simbro:** Sure. Thank you. Nothing additional to report on what I provided. If there are any questions, any of the proposed projects that are coming for this year? **Mastin:** Does anybody have any questions for James? **Jensen:** Does this include the online kitten registration stuff? **Simbro:** What do you mean? **Jensen:** I registered a litter and I tried to send the registration to a person that is getting the kitten from me. I specifically checked the box that says that it can be for breeding, but then when we got the form, it didn't have – the area that had a PIN said non-applicable. **Simbro:** Right. With CatTrack, there is no PIN number. When you mark yes, when they register the cat, the cat will have breeding rights. **Jensen:** OK. Because that created a whole lot of confusion.

Mastin: Pauli, did you have your hand up? Huhtaniemi: Yeah. Actually, I heard about the show entry form. I heard a couple of entry clerks said that they have had problems because they are receiving AOV kittens. Is it possible to change the order in the drop-down menu so that it doesn't start with the AOV? Simbro: Yeah, we can change the order. Huhtaniemi: Because people pick up the kitten. They didn't think AOV. So the kitten would be the prior and the beginning of everything. Simbro: Yeah, we can change the order of that. We copied what the old entry form was. We used to have a website with that order. We can do that easily. Mastin: Pauli, do you have a recommendation you want to submit to James? Huhtaniemi: No, everybody already knows that. We're going to fix that. Tartaglia: We know what to do.

Mastin: Pam? DelaBar: I just want to say thank you, James, for getting the microchip number on the pedigrees and the registrations. It's really going to be a big help, especially in Europe, where we have the requirements to have this information, especially when cats are sold or transferred. And I'm looking forward to the My Files when you get that online. So, thank you. Simbro: OK. Mastin: Any further questions for James? OK, James and Allene, thank you again.

I want to thank this & past Boards for the privilege of representing CFA behind the table for 40 years. So many experiences, friends, beautiful cats all make for dear memories. It was a ride I thoroughly enjoyed. Even the airport.

Vicki Nye responded to Liz and accepted her retirement letter with regret.

Biopic of Liz's service to CFA provided by Rachel Anger, CFA Judging Program-Advisor/Coordinator

Liz Watson, retiring from the Judging Program? It just doesn't seem possible, but it is true. As of May, 2025, Liz will be retiring.

Like all of the best judges, Liz was quite an exhibitor, under her cattery name of Casein. I first met Liz when she was Liz DeMercurio, showing beautiful Russian Blues. Her cats were as elegant as she was and is to this day, including the famous GC/NW Jontue Rhythm & Blues of Casein (10<sup>th</sup> Best Kitten 1980-1981 and 10<sup>th</sup> Best Cat 1981-1982), and National Winners GC/GP/NW Heartbeeps Pistol Pete of Casein (2004-2005 2<sup>nd</sup> Best Premiership Cat), GP/NW Trikourii Maurinho of Casein (2010-2011 8<sup>th</sup> Best Premiership Cat) and NW Trikourii Bowie of Casein (2012-2013 8<sup>th</sup> Best Kitten). She also showed Sphynx, including GP/NW Majikmoon Marissa Toupe of Casein (2005-2006 3<sup>rd</sup> Best Premiership Cat), and Kitten of the Year GC, NW Enchantdlair NWA Cornflake Girl. Quite an amazing exhibitor resume!

Liz was accepted into the Judging Program in 1984 and judged her first show in May 1985 in St. Clair Shores, Michigan. Since then, she has judged in shows around the world, including Russia, Finland, Estonia, Italy, the Netherlands, Spain, Israel, Thailand, China, Australia, New Zealand, Malaysia, Japan, Mexico, Brazil, Argentina and Ukraine. She has also judged the CFA International Show numerous times.

I had the honor of clerking for her, not realizing it was her first show. She was such a natural that it felt like she had always been a judge. I will never forget her Household Pet final because it was so touching. As Liz presented her Best Household Pet, she talked about her very first cat, and how that cat lit the fire in her heart for all cats. She lived in

the country as a little girl, and her mother said her dolls were naked but the cats had clothes. Yes, she had doll strollers, but it was the CATS who got pushed around in them. She loved animals then and she always will. Dolls, maybe not so much! Today, Liz has a Trikourii Russian Blue and two dogs – Fais Do Do, an Italian Greyhound, and Cosette, the Toy Poodle.

She also served as a board member for 10 years, from 1998-2009.

Jim and Cathy Dinesen started their cat fancy life in the Midwest, Leawood, KS. in 1972 with Persians under the cattery name of Fuzzyfoot. A few years later, with foundation cats from Marion Hall, they began breeding and exhibiting Manx. **Donna Fuller,** CFA Allbreed Judge retired September 18, 2022 as a CFA Judge Emeritus

It is with a heavy heart I let you all know that Donna Fuller passed away April 9, 2025. Donna was born March 18, 1946, and was raised in Boone, Iowa. Donna graduated from Iowa State University and very recently endowed a professorship at her alma mater. Donna was married to

Charles (Chuck) Fuller and they resided most of their married life in Foster City and Hillsborough, CA. Donna's husband Chuck, passed away April 20, 2022.

Donna and Chuck bred Russian Blues under the cattery name of Tsar Blu, and Donna achieved her first national winner in 1974-75 with GC BW NW Velva's Cobalt of Tsar Blu soon to be followed by national winners with her Tsar Blue prefix, the first being in 1976-77 GC BW NW Tsar Blu's Fitzwilliam. Donna also had a Persian National winner, GC NW BW Jama Kats Lil' Dickens of Tsar Blue 1978-1979. Donna was accepted in the CFA Judging Program and began judging in 1985, traveling worldwide and oftentimes taking trainee judges. Donna also served on the CFA Board of Directors as its Treasurer 1996-2000. Donna retired from the Judging Program September 18, 2022 with the highest honor of Judge Emeritus.

In addition to her love of the Cat Fancy and all things Russian Blue, Donna was an accomplished needlepointer and belonged to ANG, American Needlepoint Guild.

Donna had made her wishes known to her family that she did not want any services. Donna's infectious laugh and her presence in the show hall and needlepoint stores will be greatly missed.

#### 2024-2025 Season Guest Judging.

Approved Guest Judges limited to 10 or less without Board Approval, all other guest judges may only judge 5 CFA shows per season.

Background: As the Guest Judge Administrator approves each Guest Judging assignment, these are entered into a spreadsheet and reported in the JP Open Session reports six (6) times a year. Guest Judges are only permitted to Judge for CFA five (5) times per year, and 60 days prior to licensing the show, the Guest Judge Administrator must approve. The Club is to submit the Guest Judge Approval with their Show License request to Central Office, to be able to license a show with a Guest Judge. This practice was not followed with regard to Jurgen Trautmann for the February 22, 2025 Club Felino Espanol, so consequently, Mr. Trautmann judged 6 times for CFA during the 2024-2025 show season. The process for tracking assignments for Tier 1/Approved Guest Judges has been for the Central Office staff that handles show licensing to send an e-mail to the Guest Judging Administrator letting them know they are licensing a show which includes a Tier 1/Approved Guest Judge. The Guest Judge Administrator then adds these Tier 1/Approved Guest Judge assignments on to the spreadsheet and includes them in the Board Report. This tracking is done so that Guest Judges do not get approved for more than five (5) shows per show season, and Tier 1/Approved Guest Judges do not exceed the 10 shows per season limit as detailed in Show Rule 3.02 d.

This past show season there was a change in Central Office staffing which moved these licensing and tracking functions to different staff members, and part of the notification between the Show Licenser and the Guest Judge Administrator did not occur. Consequently, two (2) Tier 1/Approved Guest Judges, exceeded the 10 shows judged per show season 2024-2025 limit, and one (1) Guest Judge exceeded the five (5) show limit. This came to light when Dick Kallmeyer provided end of season judging assignment statistics to Vicki Nye, and the overages were noted. A conversation has taken place between the JP Co-Chair Vicki Nye and Central Office Staff member to review this procedure.

Nye: So, the first section I would like to point you to has to do with the Guest Judging Program. Does anyone have any questions about any of the prior material that's in the board report up to the Guest Judging Program? OK, so in the Guest Judging Program, we work closely with Central Office and the show license staff, Jen Brahler and Crystal Thompson, and we have certain restrictions on how many times guest judges can judge for CFA. It's in Show Rule 3.01, that a Guest Judge that's considered as or has been elevated to an Approved Guest Judge, they may judge ten times per show season, and a guest judge that is just a Guest Judge status may judge five times per show season. The Judging Program Committee and the Guest Judge Administrator does not have to approve these Approved Guest Judges. They're already preapproved, so when that show license comes in, we're reliant on notification from the licensor. There was a change in Central Office staff this last season, and those functions were moved to both Jen and Crystal, and there were a few things that slipped through the cracks, so we were not informed on some of the things that happened, and we exceeded the guest judging of five shows

per season on one individual, and also for the Approved Guest Judges, we have a couple that exceeded those limits. I have three motions here that I am presenting. In the meantime, I've had a long discussion to make sure that we're back on track with Jen and Crystal to get the notifications we need. The Judging Program Committee and the Guest Judge Administrator, we did not have – these have not officially been approved by us, and so I just want to have these approved by the board so that we are in compliance with the CFA Show Rules.

**Motion:** Approve the Guest Judging of 6 shows in the 2024-2025 show season, exceeding allowable five (5) in Show Rule 3.02.c. for Jürgen Trautmann – this was not approved by the Guest Judging Administrator, though licensed nonetheless.

**Nye:** So the first motion is [reads]. **Mastin:** OK, thank you. Discussion? Objections? Seeing no objection, motion passes unanimously.

### The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

**Motion:** Approve the Guest Judging of 13 shows in the 2024-2025 show season, exceeding allowable ten (10) in Show Rule 3.02.d. for Satu Hämäläinen.

Nye: Second motion, [reads]. Mastin: Discussion? Objections? Pam? DelaBar: I have to abstain for conflict. Mastin: OK, thank you. I'll call the vote. If you're in favor, raise your hand. Once I call your name, you can lower your hand.

Mastin called the motion. Motion Carried. DelaBar abstained with conflict.

**Mastin:** Rachel, John, Carol, Pauli, Kenny, Doreann, Vicki, Anne, Darrell, Marilee, Aki, Howard, Janet, Carissa, Kathy and Russell, If you're opposed, raise your hand. If you're an abstention with conflict, raise your hand. Pam. **Anger:** That's 16 yes, zero no, one abstention for conflict. **Mastin:** Motion passes.

*Motion:* Approve the Guest Judging of 11 shows in the 2024-2025 show season, exceeding allowable ten (10) in Show Rule 3.02.d. for Christine Merritt.

**Nye:** The third motion is [reads]. **Mastin:** Discussion? Objections? Seeing no objection, motion passes unanimously. **Nye:** Thank you.

## The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

**Nye:** I do want you to know that the Guest Judging Administrator does keep very close track on these. She sends out emails to those individuals that perhaps have four guest judging assignments that have been approved, letting them know that they allowed one more and in the case of an Approved Guest Judge when they're getting close to their 10. That's also what I report in this grid that follows the Guest Judging Report here every other month, so we are keeping track of these. We just were not aware that those other ones had been approved and that they did judge those shows. They were in the March-April time frame, so it was difficult for us to catch even if we were checking weekly because some of them were in the ID area where they are not licensing out like we do in the United States.

## Brief Summation of Immediate Past Committee Activities:

# Crown Jewel Cat Club Gulf Shore Region; Little Rock, Arkansas, USA Carissa Altschul, Regional Director

The constitution and by-laws are in order. There are 17 members. Four members are members of other CFA clubs and the vice president is president of another CFA club. Ten members are active breeders and exhibitors with CFA cattery names and two members have show production experience. The remaining members are animal lovers and show enthusiasts. This is an allbreed club and if accepted, the club plans to produce one show a year in Maumelle, Arkansas. The club also plans to work with the Maumelle rescue group and have a youth mentoring program, as well as sponsor clerking schools and breeding and grooming seminars. The dues have been set. If the club is disbanded, the funds will be donated to Maumelle Animal Control. This club was pre-noticed and one negative letter was received, to which there are several responses provided. Gulf Shore Regional Director supports this club.

Little Rock is situated in the center of the state. The city and the surrounding metropolitan area serve as a center for government, economic and cultural activities in Arkansas. The club members' breeding and show production experience is provided in my report. If accepted, this club plans to produce one show a year in Maumelle, Arkansas, a city located to the northwest of Little Rock. The Gulf Shore Regional Director supports this club.

The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

Royal Cat Club Europe Region; Cherkasy, Ukraine Pam DelaBar, Regional Director

The constitution and by-laws are in order. There are 15 members. Six members are members of other CFA clubs and the secretary is vice president of another CFA club. All of the members are actively exhibiting, ten are breeders with CFA cattery names and two are breeders registered with another association. Two members are CFA Guest Judges, four have clerking experience and four have show production experience. This is an allbreed club and if accepted, the club plans to help promote CFA and attract new breeders in Ukraine by producing three to five shows a year, sponsoring a clerking school and a judges school (BAOS), and possibly hosting regional banquets and other CFA activities. The dues have been set. If the club is disbanded, the funds will be donated to animal welfare. This club was pre-noticed and no negative letters were received. The Europe Regional Director supports this club.

**Krzanowski:** So, we will move on to the second one, which is the Royal Cat Club. This club is based in Cherkasy, a city in central Ukraine to the south of Kyiv with a population of over 269,000. Cherkasy is an important economic center of Ukraine and is home to various industries,

including the chemical, automotive and food industries. The club members' breeding and show production experience is provided in my report. If accepted, this club plans to produce three to five shows a year in Ukraine and sponsor various CFA activities and programs. The Europe Regional Director supports this club. **Mastin:** Pam, comments? **DelaBar:** We're seeing a lot of our people from the Ukraine also having an effect over in other new areas such as Poland and they're active. They're trying to be very active, considering their situation right now, so I definitely support these people. They have a view of CFA being very strong within these country areas, especially once the war stops. **Mastin:** OK, any further comments? Any objection? Seeing no objection, motion passes unanimously.

# The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

Mastin: Congratulations to the Royal Cat Club.

Supreme Sphynx Club International Division - Asia; Tuen Mun, N.T., Hong Kong Marilee Griswold & Bob Zenda, Subcommittee Co-Chairs

The constitution and by-laws are in order. There are 17 members. One member is secretary of another CFA club and a member of another. Seven members are active breeders and exhibitors with CFA cattery names. The remaining members own pedigreed cats or household pets, and many are exhibiting in CFA shows. One member has show production experience. This is an allbreed club and if accepted, the club plans to produce two or more shows a year in Hong Kong. The club also plans to sponsor clerking schools, work with local rescue groups, and hold some breeding and grooming seminars to help promote CFA and encourage proper cat care in Hong Kong. The dues have been set. If the club is disbanded, the funds will be donated to an official charity group. This club was pre-noticed and no negative letters were received. The International Division Committee supports this club.

**Mastin:** OK Carol. **Krzanowski:** The next application is from Supreme Sphynx Club. This club is based in Tuen Mun, an area in the western portion of the New Territories in northwest Hong Kong. The New Territories is one of the three areas of Hong Kong along with Hong Kong Island and Kowloon. Tuen Mun is a modern and mostly residential area with a population of approximately 540,000. The club members' breeding and show production experience is provided in my report. If accepted, this club plans to produce two or more shows a year in Hong Kong. The International Division Committee supports this club. Mastin: Darrell, any comments? Newkirk: No. We support all three of the ID applications. Mastin: OK. Marilee, I see you on here as well. Do you have any comments? Griswold: We have heard nothing negative on any of these clubs. **DelaBar:** My question is, doesn't this give Hong Kong 16 clubs now? Mastin: Darrell? Newkirk: I'm not sure of the total number, but they're all being supported. Marilee: I think we lost some this year also out of Hong Kong. Newkirk: We did. I know one club, Pirate's Meow, did not renew. Griswold: Right. We lost some in Hong Kong this year. Mastin: Carol, do you know how many clubs this will be for Hong Kong? Krzanowski: I can check because Dick Kallmeyer submitted the statistics. Let me see if I can find that quickly. Newkirk: While Carol's looking for that, this would be zero net effect, because we lost one club and this would be adding it. Mastin: If there was 15 and we lost one and we add one, it should be 15. Newkirk: Yes, exactly. There would be no change to the total

numbers. **Krzanowski:** Currently 16. **Mastin:** OK, so they currently have 16. Does that include the one they lost, Carol? **Krzanowski:** No. **Mastin:** This will bring them back to 16. OK. Any further discussion? Any objections? Seeing no objection, motion passes unanimously.

Symphony Cat Club International Division - Asia; Nonthaburi, Thailand Marilee Griswold & Bob Zenda, Subcommittee Co-Chairs

The constitution and by-laws are in order. There are 17 members. The president is the treasurer of another CFA club, and one other member is vice president of another CFA club. Six members are active breeders and exhibitors with CFA cattery names and four members are registered breeders in another association. The majority of members exhibit in both CFA and another association, and the remaining members are cat lovers with an interest in showing and starting a cattery. Three members have show production experience. This is an allbreed club and if accepted, the club plans to produce two shows a year in Nonthaburi or Bangkok, Thailand. The club also plans to work with local rescue groups and conduct breeding, grooming and health seminars to raise awareness of CFA in Thailand. The dues have been set. If the club is disbanded, the funds will be donated to an animal-related charitable organization in Thailand, such as Rakmaw Foundation or the Home for Handicapped Animals Foundation. This club was pre-noticed and no negative letters were received. The International Division Committee supports this club.

Krzanowski: Our next application is from Symphony Cat Club. This club is based in Nonthaburi, the principal city of a province by the same name in central Thailand. It is located directly northwest of Bangkok and is part of the greater Bangkok metropolitan area. With a population of over 255,000, it is the most heavily populated city after Bangkok. The club members' breeding and show production experience is provided in my report. If accepted, this club plans to produce two shows a year in Nonthaburi or Bangkok, Thailand. The International Division Committee supports this club. Mastin: Darrell? Newkirk: Yes, we got input from Allan [Raymond], who's the elected rep for there. Also, Bob and Marilee gave input and we support this. Mastin: OK, Marilee, any additional comments? Griswold: No. Mastin: OK, any discussion? Any objections? Seeing no objection, motion passed unanimously.

The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

Mastin: Congratulations and welcome, Symphony Cat Club.

Temiro Cat Fanciers International Division - AWA; Istanbul, Turkey Jan Rogers, Subcommittee Chair

The constitution and by-laws are in order. There are 17 members. One member is a member of another CFA club. Eight members are active breeders and exhibitors with CFA cattery names, and two members have catteries registered with another association. Two members have show

production experience and one member has clerking experience. The remaining members are cat lovers and owners. This is an allbreed club and if accepted, the club plans to produce one or two shows a year in Istanbul, Turkey. The club also plans to sponsor a clerking school before their first show, as well as conduct breeding, grooming and health seminars to promote responsible cat ownership and welfare. The dues have been set. If the club is disbanded, the funds will be donated to one or more animal welfare organizations, cat rescue groups or shelters. This club was pre-noticed and no negative letters were received. The AWA Subcommittee Chair supports this club.

**Krzanowski:** The last application is from Temiro Cat Fanciers. This club is based in Istanbul, the largest city in Turkey that is also the center of the country's economy, culture and history. Istanbul has a population of over 15 million, and the city is actually divided between two continents, with about 2/3 of its population living in Europe and the rest in Asia. The club members' breeding and show production experience is provided in my report. If accepted, this club plans to produce one or two shows a year in Istanbul, Turkey. The International Division Committee supports this club. Mastin: Darrell, any comments? Newkirk: No, we support it. The problem with AWA, that area of the world, is the economies there are in the tank. The entry fees and the fees that they have to pay to put shows on is killer, but they want to try so I'm supporting and I hope you will support this club. Mastin: Discussion? Pam? DelaBar: I support the club and they have been going on for a couple of years trying to come to CFA. Originally, the group was with WCF. They've always considered themselves part of Region 9 for more than one reason. Yes, their inflation rate has been well over 80%. It was just off the wall, but it's a cultural issue that we have with our exhibitors. Some have to wear scarves when they're in Asia and they don't have to wear scarves when they're in Europe. We do have some considerations culturally that way, but I will support the club, though I believe it belongs in Region 9 instead of the AWA. Mastin: Thank you, Pam. Newkirk: You can have it. DelaBar: I don't want the inflation. Thank you. Mastin: Any further discussion? Any objections? Seeing no objection, motion passes unanimously.

Mastin: Congratulations and welcome, Temiro Cat Fanciers.

### **Brief Summation of Immediate Past Committee Activities:**

In that file I am listing a copy of the show license application, the show flyer, the breed summary, the online count and after the show has been scored, Cathy Dunham sends me the marked master clerk catalog for that show. If you have any questions about an International Division show, send me a request and I can provide any of the information that I have listed above.

We are in the final steps of completing planning for the combined CFA ID-China and CFA ID-other banquet details that will be held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia on November 3, 2025. This is further clarified in the ID-Other report.

### **Current Happenings Committee:**

**Mastin:** Darrell, International Division. **Newkirk:** Thank you, Mr. President. I don't have any action items. This is basically an update for everyone. I've completed a year as Chair of the Committee, and I did some evaluations on some things that we could improve. As I state in the report, I have a Dropbox file for every show. I'm keeping a copy of the show license, the show flyers, the online entry count, and the breed summary. After the show is scored, Cathy Dunham sends me a copy of the marked master clerk catalog, and that also is included in the file. So, if anyone, starting with this show season, has a question about any show, I can provide that data to you. I also have instituted a groups io for international entry clerks as a way of

communicating with them and, as I said with Allene, I will share with them the motion that we passed earlier about the TRNs, and reiterate to them that they have to collect those fees and send them in. As I said earlier, I wanted to move the discussion about the combined China and ID-Other Awards Banquet.

#### China Subcommittee

China has been busy in 2024-2025 Show Season, with a total of 59 shows produced.

West China produced 6 shows; North China Produced 10 shows and the balance of 43 shows in East China, mostly in Shanghai.

In 2025 the current show schedule shows that in West China we have 2 shows scheduled; North China has 0 shows scheduled, and in East China 20 shows scheduled. I am sure we will see more shows scheduled as the year progresses. There are also 2 shows scheduled for 2027 and 2028.

The activity in China is beginning to improve. Our representatives in East, West and North China are actively working to increase their shows and particularly in areas that do not have many CFA shows now.

Representatives for the different areas of China are as follows:

China East 5D Wang China West Gavin Cao China North Allen Shi

As always, with so many local associations putting on shows, it is sometimes difficult to get new people to try our CFA shows, but we are slowly making progress. We are thankful that we have loyal people who have stayed with our organization through all the trials and tribulations of Covid to bring CFA back to China.

To enhance this effort are our Associate Judges, many of whom have applied to the regular CFA Judging program, make it more economical to put on multiple shows. Although registrations are down at this point, our people in China are young, and enthusiastic, bringing in more new people every show.

I continue to maintain and share a spreadsheet containing all the dates clubs have reserved for shows based on information provided by Nadia Jaffar (our Show Scheduler) and updated as shows are reviewed by Marilee & I and approved in coordination with Jen Brahler. We still have bay check-in in the ID, and we've had a problem trying to figure out who's judging Saturday and Sunday. This was last show season. I can go in now to the contracts and see who's scheduled to judge on Saturday. So, before it's been an issue. I've had to try to get ahold of the entry clerk or the show manager to find out who was judging. So, one-day shows and six-by-six shows are not an issue, but two-day shows where you have a set of judges on Saturday, a set of judges on Sunday, I would like the show rule to state that the day that the judges are officiating must be listed on the flyer. So, that's something I want to work with Carol and Ed on for you guys to present in October. That should be an easy fix. Mastin: Darrell, you got anything else? Newkirk: Well, I went through all the new show rules and made a file. I basically collected Rachel's combined report on the rules that we presented, and then a few of the minor changes. I went through and listed all those that's been posted for the ID clubs and the closing date moving to Wednesday was very important and making sure that the online entry system is used. All this stuff is a learning process for a lot of the clubs over there because, you

know, English is not their primary language. So, we have problems with communication sometimes. So, if someone is not understanding, I've got to try to find somebody who can communicate with them in their native tongue, but we're working on things. I'm really, really happy that the show flyers are being improved. That's really a great thing that's happening in the ID right now. **Mastin:** Does anyone have any questions for Darrell? Darrell, thank you.

# (9) TREASURER'S REPORT SUMMARY.

Treasurer Kathy Calhoun gave the following report:

May 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025

### Registration:

Total registration contributed \$665,476 to the bottom line. This represents 85.00% of the budget.

Mastin: Kathy, please do the Treasurer's Report. We're going to keep going. Calhoun: OK, I hope that you had an opportunity to review the Treasurer's Report. Basically, the Treasurer's Report end of season talks to three major income and expense. The total registration is 85% of budget. We continue to see registration decline. I really believe that registering a kitten or having a TRN number to show a kitten will make a significant difference in that number moving forward. I highly recommend that all kittens be registered, whether they are for show or not. Our total registration is 85% of budget.

### **Ordinary Income**

Ordinary income, which comprises various income categories, excluding publications, marketing, and events, contributed **\$1,590,400**. This figure represents 87% of the budget.

**Calhoun:** The other two major events that we had was the Coralville annual meeting last year, last season. Net income was negative \$65,747. So, be mindful that an annual is not an income-generating item. It is a celebration. I believe that the Coralville team did a very good job. Iowa is a more economic place to hold an annual than others. We move it around. So \$65,000 loss is considerably less than what we've had in the past. I would actually want to phrase that not as a loss, but a cost to have that meeting.

Calhoun: The International Show came in at a \$2,128 loss as of the last review of the financials. I just looked again because we've made some changes and some adjustments. We would typically do that sort of thing. I know that the International Show Committee is doing a yeoman's job and working really, really hard at turning that into an income-generating event once again, so that is good news.

#### **Bottom Line**

As provided in the 2024 - 2025 pre-audited financials, the net operating loss is \$242,098.

**Calhoun:** The bottom line is that we will experience a \$242,000 net operating loss. This is far from ideal. This is not where we want to be. This is not what we can continue to be. This is better than prior year, so there have been some improvements made, but we need to put strategies around addressing this and turning it around. One of the strategies was the kitten issue, so I appreciate support on that.

### **Current Committee Initiatives:**

The primary mission of the New Exhibitor Committee is to engage and retain new exhibitors in the cat fancy. We believe exhibitors leave the hobby for a variety of reasons, with the most common being:

- 1. Lack of Competitive Cats: Newcomers often become discouraged when they do not have cats of sufficient quality to succeed in competition. They often don't understand that this is the problem as they don't have a good comprehension of the breed standard.
- 2. Lack of Inclusion and Support: New exhibitors frequently report that they do not feel welcome or supported by experienced exhibitors.

Our initial focus has been on addressing the second issue: creating a more welcoming and supportive environment. To that end:

- Regional Coordinators are now reaching out weekly to new exhibitors at show closing, sending a welcome letter and informational packet.
- These packets include detailed guidance on navigating the show process, from enclosures to point calculations.
- Show helpers are assigned to act as friendly, accessible contacts at the show.
- We are refining this process to include checks and balances to ensure follow-through, though verification is difficult for events I cannot personally attend.

### Addressing the First Challenge:

The issue of competitive quality is more complex. Traditional mentorship programs have proven ineffective. Therefore, we piloted a new format during the April Neosho show.

This initiative was inspired by a growing group of new Maine Coon breeders – many of whom were originally introduced at our show and have since brought in others. At the December show, we had over 30 Maine Coons exhibited, largely by young and enthusiastic new breeders.

After many conversations between myself and Martha Auspitz, we launched a Maine Coon Symposium, focused on:

- Breed standard
- *Grooming techniques*
- Color identification

- Breeding basics
- *Q&A* with attendees

Martha Auspitz presented the seminar and brought one of her own cats for live demonstration. The 30-minute sessions were held during lunch on both show days.

## Feedback and Response:

#### Pros:

- 23 breeders/exhibitors attended
- The symposium was extremely well received and energized participants
- Facebook promotion attracted spectators specifically for the seminar

### Sample Attendee Comments:

"Very informative. Good stuff. We need more of these things."

"Loved this. Great and helpful information. So nice to be able to ask questions."

"Very helpful for new and experienced breeders alike."

"Martha did a fantastic job—covered colors, shampooing, and breeding. Many great tips!"

### Cons:

A major challenge was ensuring judges took a hard lunch break. Despite prior agreement, one judge resumed judging early, and the large Maine Coon class was called during the symposium. This undermined the effectiveness of our efforts and frustrated attendees.

**Mastin:** Janet, please do the New Exhibitor report. **Moyer:** OK. I hope everybody had an opportunity to review the report and watch the video. My report outlines all the things that we're currently doing for all the new exhibitor entries, including Regions 1 through 7. The breed symposium that we held at the Neosho show, which was by all metrics a huge success, and that was what the video showed. Does anybody have any questions? **Nasin:** I just wanted to make a comment. I liked that video, and I actually forwarded it to a new potential Maine Coon breeder. She tried to enter our show last week, did not know anything. So, I sent her to a bunch of people, and I sent that link of Becky, right? **Moyer:** Martha. **Nasin:** Yeah. Martha, who did the whole description. I was like, oh, that's a good video. I'll send that to her, because she had a ton of questions. So I just wanted to make a comment.

### **Future Projections:**

Symposium Part Two is planned for a future Neosho show. Topics will include:

- Cattery setup
- Breeding program planning
- Further study of the breed standard

We will collaborate with Regional New Exhibitor Coordinators to:

- Identify similar opportunities across other regions
- Organize future breed-specific and general educational symposiums

A general exhibitor symposium is also under consideration, focusing on:

- Finding a quality show cat
- Basic grooming
- Showing fundamentals

The committee will reach out to the Judging Program to emphasize the importance of respecting scheduled hard stops when committee-led educational events are planned.

## Brief Summation of Immediate Past Committee and Group Activities

We thank George Eigenhauser for his many years of dedication and hard work as Chair of the Committee. Most fanciers do not realize the amount of work, heartache, stress and sleepless nights go into trying to combat the many ways that we are under siege in local, state, federal and international legislation. His guidance will continue to be greatly valued and we wish him a relaxing time in his retirement as Chair.

While many state legislatures have concluded their legislative sessions, a few remain notably active. The calendar never ends for the more local levels of government, requiring a continued keen eye and the help of the fancy. For those unaware, the Pet Advocacy Network (PAN) provides us with lists of bill introductions at the state and federal level based on search parameters we provide. In recent years they have been able to include more local and administrative/regulatory matters. We then read through the bills, ordinances, or proposed regulations and select the most relevant for CFA tracking.

We additionally monitor multiple animal-related online lists, collaborate with other animal-friendly groups online, use online "alerts" and importantly, rely on our "grassroots" fanciers in reporting pet-related legislation in their area ("You are the eyes and ears of the fancy.") We continue to watch major Animal Rights groups, their websites and public events for information on upcoming legislative initiatives, as well as actively monitoring what is happening overseas as Europe is increasingly becoming a predictor of what is to come in the US. However, no amount of monitoring can replace fanciers as our source of information. Recently, each Region has been asked to designate one legislative liaison for urgent alerts to be circulated when topical legislation arises. We also will ask each Regional Director to include their legislative liaison or legislative topics at each Regional meeting to emphasize the importance of grassroots monitoring.

The CFA Legislative Group communicates with fanciers about legislation through email, the CFA newsletter, online mailing groups, its Facebook page, and its blog. The CFA Legislative News Facebook page provides cat fanciers with a source of current news articles on legislative issues and alerts. By posting various legislative articles from the news media or other groups focused on pet legislation, usually involving cats, fanciers can use the Facebook page as a first stop to check for news that may affect them. The Facebook page has over 1,000 followers as of June 8, 2025.

The CFA Legislative Group Blog was established in September 2018 to provide a holding place for work done by the Group that is available for easy reference to us and the public. In addition, CFA has now created space on the main CFA framework to feature CFA's Legislative Group and hosts regular "What's Hot" blog posts that have helped explain to the fancy and the public what new legislation was under consideration, provided explanations in plain text of the flaws in bills as written and given instructions on ways to express opposition. The CFA Legislative Group Blog also contains links information on why we oppose the bills we do from the Advocacy in Action series drafted by members of the Legislative Group. Further, it contains a simple flowchart to assist breeders in understanding why or why not they need licensing from USDA APHIS, and how to avoid running afoul of that requirement.

What many breeders and fanciers may not know is the additional wealth of information this site, and even its previous iteration, that we commonly receive questions about. Under our Resources tab, one can find out how to very simply write letters in opposition or support of legislation, position statements, including those in opposition to the recent movement to ban all brachycephalic breeds beginning in 2024 with New Hampshire HB 1102, and rationales for opposing things like cat licensing.

# **Current Happenings of Committee and Group:**

Highlights of a few selected issues: (Not by any means complete - just a few examples.)

#### **Federal**

HR 2253: "Puppy Protection Act of 2025". Would amend the Animal Welfare Act to add care requirements for dog dealers. Referred to the Subcommittee on Livestock, Dairy, and Poultry.

HR 349: "Goldie's Act". Would expand enforcement provisions of the Animal Welfare Act, including requiring the USDA to provide a copy of all records documenting violations to state, local, and municipal animal control or law enforcement officials within 24 hours of such inspections or investigations. Referred to the Subcommittee on Livestock, Dairy, and Poultry.

SB 1538: "Better Care for Animals Act of 2025." Would amend the Animal Welfare Act to expand and improve the enforcement capabilities of the Attorney General, and for other purposes. Referred to the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

#### State

DE HB 131: Would provide that a retail pet store or broker may not sell, lease, offer to sell, offer to lease, barter, auction, transfer ownership, or dispose of any cats or dogs, but doesn't prohibit the showcasing of animals for adoption. Voted out of committee and on the ready list.

FL HB 1481: House Bills 1481, 1583, and 1585 would have created dog breeder certificates of registration and a dog breeding trust fund if enacted. Cats were not included in these bills. These bills (and the similar Senate Bills 1830, 1832, and 1834) were all indefinitely postponed and withdrawn from consideration.

- GA SR 255: Creating the Senate Study Committee on Combating Unscrupulous Companion Animal Breeding Practices; and for other purposes. Adopted.
- HI SB 593: Would have established commercial dog breeding licensing regulations. Died.
- IA SF 107: Would prohibit declawing of cats. Ended the session in committee. Iowa bills may carry over from odd-numbered years to even-numbered years.
- KY SB 122: Regulation of pet shop dog and cat sales and preemption over local ordinances governing pet shop rules. Died.
- MN HB 1296: Would modify the classification of commercial dog and cat breeder data collected and maintained by the Board of Animal Health; modify kennel and dealer advertising requirements; and require the Board of Animal Health to post certain kennel, dealer, and commercial breeder information. Similar to SF 1029. The 2025 session has ended, but bills may carry over from odd-numbered years to even-numbered years.
- MN HB 1857: Would prohibit the elective declawing of cats. Similar to SF 1935. The 2025 session has ended, but bills may carry over from odd-numbered years to even-numbered years.
- MN HB 2490: Would establish, provide duties, and appropriate money for the Companion Animal Board. Similar to SF 415. The 2025 session has ended, but bills may carry over from odd-numbered years to even-numbered years.
- MN HB 2541: Would add a new Section 35.025 to state statutes abolishing the Board of Animal Health, transferring its duties to the Department of Agriculture, and establishing the Animal Health Advisory Council to advise on animal health matters. The 2025 session has ended, but bills may carry over from odd-numbered years to even-numbered years.
- MN HB 2627: Would prohibit the sale of dogs and cats by retail pet shops. Similar to SF 1943. The 2025 session has ended, but bills may carry over from odd-numbered years to even-numbered years.
- MN HB 2733: Provides that a person who injures another person's pet is liable to the owner of the pet for the cost of the injury, including medical bills, actual damages, emotional damages, and punitive damages. The 2025 session has ended, but bills may carry over from odd-numbered years to even-numbered years.
- MO HB 185: Would amend the Animal Care and Facilities Licensing/Regulation Act to provide that commercial breeders shall maintain healthy breeding practices on all animals used for breeding to include genetic testing, USDA-recommended vaccinations, X-ray screening (for presence or risk of hip dysplasia), annual veterinarian examination of breeding males and intact females (with photographs), photographs of housing enclosures. It would also add consumer protection provisions and other mandates. Died.
- NY AB 8653: Would redefine "pet dealer;" and add a definition for "broker,". If enacted, it would redefine a pet dealer to mean any person who breeds animals and sells or offers to sell more than nine animals that are born and raised on such a person's residential premises directly

to a consumer. The proposed threshold is a lifetime threshold for licensing as a pet dealer. The current definition of pet dealer is any person who sells or offers to sell more than nine animals per year for profit to the public. But the bills would remove the current exception for any breeder selling or offering to sell fewer than 25 animals per year born and raised on their residential premise. Brokers would be added to the retail pet store sale prohibition for dogs, cats, and rabbits. Referred to the Assembly Agriculture Committee. Senate Bill 8252 was the same as AB 8653 but has since been amended to add back in the one calendar year period and has been recommitted to the Senate Agriculture Committee.

NJ SB 1406: Would prohibit declawing of cats and other animals. Same as AB 1180. Referred to the Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee and the Assembly Commerce, Economic Development, and Agriculture Committee, respectively.

NV AB 487: Amends Title 50, Chapter 574 of Nevada Revised Statutes by adding a new section to prohibit a retail pet store from selling, offering to sell, bartering, auctioning or otherwise transferring ownership of any dog or cat. Died.

RI HB 5926: Would add authority for emotion-based damages to animal cruelty laws if enacted. Held for further study.

RI SB 325: Originally amended the definition of "hobby breeder" to restrict hobby breeders to limit the sale or offering for sale no more than two (2) litters of dogs or cats, or a combination thereof, in a three hundred and sixty-five (365) day period. On June 5<sup>th</sup> the bill was amended to restrict hobby breeders to whelping two litters of dogs or cat or a combination of cats and dogs in one calendar year. This was passed on the Senate floor. Up for House consideration.

RI SB 340: Imposes a sales tax on the purchase of animals for breeders. Referred to Senate Finance.

TX HB 562: would require that a licensed breeder provide to a purchaser a bill of sale for each animal sold or exchanged in return for consideration. Failed to meet House deadline. Died.

TX HB 2653: Would prohibit certain claw-altering procedures on cats, with exceptions for medical necessity or owner health protection. Failed to meet House deadline. Died.

TX HB 3458: Would prohibit the retail sale of dogs and cats in pet stores. Failed to meet House deadline. Died. Identical SB 1652 was left pending in committee.

VA SB 903: Would amend pet shop laws to include additional recordkeeping requirements and expand sourcing restrictions on dog sales to apply for all animals sold or offered for sale by a pet shop. Enacted.

VA SB 916: Adds a provision that local governing bodies may regulate or restrict the acquisition, marketing, and sale of animals in a pet shop, provided that such ordinance is consistent with state law. Died.

#### Local

Greeley, CO: Retail dog and cat sale prohibition for city pet stores. Adopted.

Windsor, CO: Ordinance amending the municipal code to prohibit the retail sale of dogs and cats in town. The prohibition does not apply to PACFA-licensed organizations. Adopted.

Leon County, FL: Prohibition on the sale of dogs, cats, and rabbits by retail pet stores. Adopted.

DeKalb County, GA: An Ordinance that would require owners of female intact companion animals to obtain litter permits and add restrictions on the sale and transfer of dogs, cats, and rabbits. Adopted.

Dunwoody, GA: Retail Pet Store ordinance prohibiting the retail sale of dogs and cats. Adopted.

Beverly, MA: would prohibit the sale of live amphibians, birds, reptiles, or mammals in city pet shops. Adopted.

Detroit, MI: Retail pet store sales ban on dogs and cats. Adopted.

Oak Grove, MO: Retail pet store ban on the sale of cats and dogs. Adopted.

Las Vegas, NV: Limits the number of animals that can be sold by a pet shop or breeder to one person or household during a calendar year. Adopted.

Las Vegas, NV: Would establish the Animal Advisory Committee. Failed.

West Norriton, PA: Considering a Retail Pet Store ordinance prohibiting the retail sale of dogs, cats, and rabbits.

### European Union

We are working with our liaisons and representatives to Region 9 as they attempt to combat laws introduced both in member nations and across the Union. We hope to be able to increase our assistance to them but face several hurdles with regard to information access in the US.

### Litigation

The CFA Board has allowed CFA to join with the Animal Health Institute (AHI) coalition on amicus curiae (friend of the court) briefs opposing non-economic damages (i.e. "pain and suffering") for injuries to animals. They are monitoring lower court litigation and will keep us informed if an appropriate situation develops. There is nothing new to report this time period.

### **Publications**

The CFA e-Newsletter provides space for a "What's Hot" legislative column used to provide brief information on new and urgent matters of interest to the cat fancy. These began for inclusion as Cat Talk Almanac articles but continue in the e-Newsletter in order to produce

information on less time-sensitive matters with a focus on advocacy guidance. Articles since the February 2025 Board meeting:

\* CFA e-Newsletter, April 2025, **Rhode Island Legislation: Hobby Breeders, Sales Tax,** and Emotion-based Damages" by Kelly Crouch, CFA Legislative Information Liaison. A proposed amendment to Rhode Island statutes regulating cat and dog breeders would increase the number of breeders subject to state licensing while eliminating the dog-only exemption. Senate Bill 325 amends the existing definition of hobby breeder but reduces the number of litters a breeder can sell and avoid classification as a breeder subject to licensing.

Also discussed was Rhode Island Senate Bill 340, which could also have a significant impact on Rhode Island breeders. If enacted, it would add the purchase of animals from a breeder to the many things subject to sales tax. This bill has been referred to the Senate Finance Committee, and House Bill 5926, which would add authority for emotion-based damages to animal cruelty laws if enacted, has been referred for study. While that often means the end of a bill, the Speaker of the House can bring it back for consideration. It should be noted that the speaker is also the bill sponsor. Emotion-based, or noneconomic, damages increase the cost of pet care for all while benefitting the rare few pet owners.

UPDATE: SB 325 was amended on June 5, 2025. See Current Happenings for the current status of the bill.

CFA e-Newsletter, April 2025 "Oregon Legislation Targets Breeders for Licensing and Increases Fees for Shelters and Rescues" by Kelly Crouch, CFA Legislative Information Liaison. The Natural Resources and Wildfire Committee heard testimony in opposition and support at the public hearing held on March 18, 2025. Not surprisingly, most of the testimony from Animal Rescue Entities (AREs) opposed the license fee increase and supported licensing all breeders, whom they blame for shelter overcrowding issues. Yet the vast majority of dogs and cats in shelters are random-bred animals, not purpose-bred animals. Pedigreed cats represent only 3-5% of the cat population. It is incredulous to claim pedigreed cat breeders are responsible for the homeless cat population. Purebred dogs also make up a minority of the dog population. Considering that most owned animals are sterilized, responsible owners and breeders are not contributing significantly to the homeless animal population. Shelter animals are generally the victims of home retention failures. Oregon breeders are not to blame for overcrowding caused by the common ARE practice of importing animals from other states and even other countries – a fact proponents like to ignore. Homelessness for animals is a community problem and should be addressed that way.

In the April 8, 2025, work session, the Senate Committee on Natural Resources and Wildfire adopted the amended bill, SB 1076-1, in a 3- 2 vote. The amendments include changes to definitions and requirements in both the breeder licensing and animal welfare entities sections. For cat and dog fanciers, there is an important, if minuscule, carve-out for breeders to avoid licensing. The amendment requires licensing of cat and dog breeders who "during a 12-month period, sells or transfers or offers for sale or transfer

more than two litters". It also authorizes the department to define the number of birds or small mammals sold during a 12-month period necessary for licensing. The A-engrossed (fair final copy of the first amended version of the bill) SB 1076 has been assigned to the Joint Ways and Means Committee.

\* CFA e-Newsletter, March 2025 "New Jersey Bill Establishing a Working Group on Responsible Animal Breeding" by Kelly Crouch, CFA Legislative Information Liaison. New Jersey Assembly Bill 5173 aims to establish a working group on responsible breeding while not including cat breeders in the discussion at all, choosing instead to seat two representatives from the world of dog breeders and the remaining seats will be filled by representatives from an animal rights organization, the New Coalition of Responsible Pet Stores, and the New Jersey Farm Bureau. The working group would develop a framework for legislative, administrative, and policy recommendations to uphold ethical breeding practices statewide, eliminate unethical breeding, and devise a plan to implement their recommendations. It is crucial to recognize that these groups often advocate for licensing schemes that can unfairly burden small, in-home hobby breeders, which could stifle our community. Moreover, since cats have distinct needs that differ from those of dogs, relying solely on dog breeders to represent us is inadequate—they simply do not possess the specialized knowledge necessary to advocate for feline interests.

### Meetings and Conferences:

Humane World for Animals (formerly HSUS); Animal Care Expo 2026, April 7-10, 2026, David L. Lawrence Convention Center, Pittsburgh, PA. This conference provides positive networking with a variety of animal groups and leaders who are often unaware of our devotion to the welfare of cats and our common love of animals. Our continuing CFA presence at the Expos each year gives us an opportunity to reinforce CFA's goal of promoting respect for all cats with an emphasis on public education. This conference provides positive networking with a variety of animal groups and leaders who are often unaware of our devotion to the welfare of cats and our common love of animals. While the Expo is often used to highlight upcoming HWA (HSUS) legislation, some of which is harmful to cat breeders, this year no new legislative initiatives were announced.

# Future Projections for Committee and Legislative Group:

### Upcoming conferences related to legislation –committed or pending:

**Pet Week on Capitol Hill** will be held in Washington, D.C. during the week of September 11, 2025. Unfortunately, it was not in the CFA budget to attend this year.

The event joins CFA with a coalition of pet-related groups, which have including HABRI, the Pet Food Institute, the Pet Advocacy Network, CFA, AKC, the World Pet Association (WPA), Animal Health Institute (AHI), Nestle-Purina, Mars Petcare, American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) and many more. Many of the Pet Night sponsors work with us on joint legislative strategies on matters ranging from non-economic damages, pet shop bans, and other issues.

Participants provide us with legislative information, access to inside opinions of their lobbyists, and other help throughout the year. We hope to raise the funds to attend next year.

## Ongoing goals -

- Working on offensive strategies to share CFA's mission and positive work with respect to TRN, spay neuter campaigns, and positive, healthy breeding practices.
- Increasing use of social media to expand our reach to fanciers and the public and increase awareness of legislative issues on pet ownership.
- Networking with the sheltering community, aligned organizations, veterinarians and lawmakers so we better understand the problems and trends that cause homeless animals to be in shelters and develop ways to address the issues that motivate legislation detrimental to our interests.
- Continuing to find new methods for presenting perspective on the cat fancy views to those in animal related fields and government.
- Working with national and local cat fancy teams to defeat legislation/regulation detrimental to pedigreed cats, feral/unowned cats, CFA's mission and cat ownership.
- Enlisting professional help with strategic public relations and communication to build greater public awareness and gain more support for our opposition to mandated sterilization laws across the country.
- Increasing efforts to raise funds for the Sy Howard Legislative Fund and to help clubs present projects suitable for funding.

Mastin: OK, we're going to go on to CFA Legislative. Is Alene here? Come on up, Alene. You can sit here, right next to Rachel. We call that the hot seat. **Shafnisky:** That's awesome. **Mastin:** Right next to the attorney. **Shafnisky:** So, I've looked over the last few sets of minutes and it seems like some of you have questions as to what we as a Committee actually

do. There were some questions about why we ask exhibitors for help the way that we do. Right now, as a Committee, the three of us are tracking over 750 laws and regulations just at the state and federal level. Now, the U.S. has over 90,000 local government units and each of them has the ability to change their laws at any time. The problem is, most of them use like a photo PDF program to post their agendas and that's not searchable by normal web searches. So, we can set up all of the searches and alerts that we want online. They can't search those agendas. So, that's why we ask exhibitors to take a look at those and let us know when something's coming up. Most of those online materials are available early now, thanks to sunshine laws. So, we're receiving reports at least weekly, but since I've taken this on, this is a daily thing that we are working on. Our Committee is every day researching laws. Any alert we get, we want to make sure that when we put out an alert, it's 100% factually correct. We need to research the legislative calendars to make sure that everything is being alerted at the right time. And so, that is why it takes us a little bit of time and we sometimes lag behind, but we do need the help from exhibitors. So, does anybody have questions for me?

Mastin: Carissa? Altschul: In the past, I've criticized the Legislative Committee because I feel like there's a lot of, "oh, this happened", and I understand that you can't track everything, but some of the bigger laws and some of the bigger changes, I feel like things could have been done by exhibitors if they'd known in advance, but a big part of my criticism has been a lack of partnership with other animal registering bodies because I just don't understand why we can't be partnering, like your Committee reaches out to whoever is handling the legislative overview at AKC or other cat registering bodies, because AKC is on it and most bills that affect dogs, it's very easy for those bills to then say, "and cats." For example, in Texas, AKC successfully litigated and managed to get the breeder law an exemption for breeders who show, but it was only for dog breeders. We didn't know anything about it until it already had passed the legislative body. So now, dog breeders who show are exempt, but cat breeders who show in Texas are not. Even the person who does the inspections who came – because we're inspected, we're licensed – said, "well, I don't know why cats weren't included in this. It seems silly to me." Well, it's because nobody asked it. By the time we heard about it, it had already been passed. So, is there other plans for your Committee to try to reach out and coordinate your efforts with what's already happening so we don't have to start from scratch? Shafnisky: I will tell you that we already do. I meet with the AKC team by Zoom probably once a month to develop some strategies going forward. We have some things in the pipeline, but they are probably the most active, but we reach out to any other – or we work with TICA. We work with other organizations. There is no lack of cooperation with other animal registries. I think the real problem is that AKC employs a team of full-time attorneys – I think 11 of them. They have registered lobbyists. They have people who are really in there working the system, and they just don't feel like they know enough about cats in order to start advocating for us. Now, I can talk to them, and I do talk to them, but you have to understand that they're kind of the most powerful legislative team, and they're really just focused on dogs. They don't want to make a misstep by including cats in something that doesn't apply. So, I can tell you I intend to try to be more proactive in that sense. I'm not a registered lobbyist, though, so I'm not sure how far I can get. CFA can't afford to donate money to campaigns. That's a problem, you know. So, we are working together. We do work hard, so I want you to know that. Mastin: Carissa, do you have anything further? Altschul: No. Calhoun: Kathy? I wonder if it could be considered, because I get it. I fully get it that AKC is, they have the volume, they have the dollars, they have the politics, they have all of that that we don't have. But I just wonder if, not to go too far in this

discussion today, but maybe something to consider if, in fact, the cat registries could collaborate together, because what's a problem for one registration for a cattery registered in CFA in Texas is a problem for that cattery that is a TICA cattery. So, there would be more help. The more boots on the ground, noise you can make, money you can generate, town halls you can go to, the more people, the better. This might be an opportunity to do some collaborations. I'm just tossing it out there. I have not had any conversations with anybody regarding this, even if there is a desire to do something. Shafnisky: I can tell you that we communicate regularly with TICA's team as well. Pretty much anything that we get that's going to affect cats, we try to share with them, too. They bring things to us if they think we haven't heard about them. So, there is a communication line. There's certainly something that could be looked at in that sense, and certainly, let's put it this way, they're better at raising funds than we are right now, and that's across the board. So, it could be possible that, yes, we can take some ideas from them in order to generate some more dollars and maybe get some more attention on these issues for the cat breeders. Calhoun: From a financial standpoint, if in fact the cat world needs a lobbyist or whatever it is, we don't even know what that number would cost, what it would cost to implement that. To say whether or not it's a hands up or hands down, out of our range, or maybe not so much. Or maybe there's some moderation. So, I would appreciate, and I'm sure that all of us would appreciate, at least to have some idea of what that would cost. Shafnisky: Absolutely. Calhoun: For the next year.

DelaBar: Alene, you said that Pet Week on Capitol Hill is going to be the week of 11 September in your report. Shafnisky: Correct. DelaBar: A whole week. Not a pet night? No special pet night? Shafnisky: Well, Pet Night is usually what we attend. DelaBar: OK. Shafnisky: The cost has grown significantly to attend that. So, when the budget numbers came back this year, it was not – DelaBar: How much money do you need? Shafnisky: \$7,500. DelaBar: Wow. Really? Shafnisky: Yeah. That was kind of our reaction. DelaBar: Well, I mean, I've been to Pet Night. I've done it. So yes, you have hotel, you have meals, and it's in an expensive area. Transportation, the whole, you know. Shafnisky: That's just for the table. DelaBar: Oh, that's for the table? Shafnisky: Yeah. That's just for the table. DelaBar: That is for the table. And who gets that money? I want to know, does that come under Health and Human Services or does that come – Ag or what? Shafnisky: That's a very good question, but they sure are raising a lot of money with it. DelaBar: Thank you. Shafnisky: Just to let you know, there are some other conventions that we do go to that I'm going to come forward and ask, and they cost significantly less. Mastin: Any further questions? Alene, do you have any further comments? Thank you very much.

a responsible, educated and ethical individual who breeds to sustain and safeguard their breed to assure its continued existence and produce litters which meets the written breed standard

**Mastin:** Jacqui Bennett, would you come up to the table here, please? Welcome to the meeting. **Bennett:** Thank you. **Mastin:** I saw you walk in. I know Ginger's not here, so I'm – **Bennett:** I'm Ginger and me. **Mastin:** OK, great. Well, you're up next. You have Preservation Breeding.

**Bennett:** Good morning, everybody. I will not take a whole lot of your time. I wanted to let you know the current status and success of the Preservation Breeding Committee. At this point, if you recall, when we first started this Committee, we developed a charter with five pillars, and we have focused very intensely on the first pillar, which is public relations, making sure that the public knows about what preservation breeding is on a breed standpoint and on a CFA standpoint, after we came up with approved definitions that you, the board, approved in one of our first meetings. With the incredible assistance of New Vision Cat Club and Melody Boyd, those videos that we have created – CFA breeders, CFA judges, and CFA exhibitors – have accrued more than two and a half million views on three platforms. They constitute over three quarters of our breeds done by exhibitors, as well as by judges and breed council secretaries, focusing on what preservation breeding is, emphasizing the definition, including preservation breeding videos on the importance of Household Pets as part of preservation breeding, with focus on not creating Household Pets, and spaying and neutering, and understanding pedigreed versus non-pedigreed, and purebred versus non-purebred, and understanding those definitions. We would like to go forward into the next pillars as we move forward into the next year, which includes educational information, both with talking points for our CFA judges, so that we are giving consistent messages in the rings, so everybody is using the same definitions, the same terms, and the same talking points, as well as education for professional organizations, such as rescue organizations, and working with the Marketing team for collateral. So, that is the extent of the Preservation Breeding Committee at this time. Are there any questions? Mastin: Pam? DelaBar: Do you have anyone from outside the U.S. working on this Committee? Bennett: At this time, no. We haven't had any volunteers from outside the U.S. DelaBar: Have you called for volunteers? Bennett: Yes, we have. Mastin: Pam, are you volunteering? DelaBar: Yes, I need more to do, Rich. Obviously, I'm – Newkirk: She's just an RD. Mastin: I have some openings, so we'll talk during the break. DelaBar: No, no, no. I just want to know, because, you know, there are different focuses that go on, on different continents, and we do have some people that would be, I think, work very well with this group. **Bennett:** We would love to have people from - DelaBar: I will make sure I give you their names. Bennett: Thank you. Mastin: Thank you, Pam. Any further comments, questions? Great job. Thank you. Bennett: OK.

### Brief Summation of Immediate Past Committee Activities:

We are continuing to provide rescue and downsize large groups of felines for CFA breeders. Most cases were 15-60 felines per cattery, one cattery had almost 100 felines to downsize (cats were well maintained and premises clean, Animal Control let us downsize as space was available over 9 months), provide vetting and S-N, adoption for a variety of factors.

We provided rescue to four (4) Animal Control cases. Animal Control did not know about BAP and were glad to work with our program. We found we had a couple seniors who were starting to experience dementia, family was unable to talk them into surrender of cats and utility companies notified Animal Control of issues. We have to work very gently through these type cases. It is like starting over every day due to breeder memory issues.

One abandonment case was very stressful as the Breeder disappeared. Family members sent cats to Rescue as they were in terrible shape and refused to talk to anyone. They sent co-owners who contacted them on wild goose chases. Co-owner breeders were in distress as we could not find where the family sent the cats, only one person was able to pick up a cat that was paid for and it was the wrong sex, they discovered at the Vet when shaved.

We provided food and litter to catteries in need including in Region 9. Breeds that went to rescue via our Breed Rescue Program are Long Haired Selkirk, Ragdolls, British Shorthair, American Shorthair, Persian, Tonkinese, Siamese, Ocicat, Bengals, Balinese, Mau, Himalayan, Aby, Maine Coon and Birman: Number of cats that our program handled ~ 472, Number of Purebred FIP kittens cats and kittens treated by our Rescue Partners~74. We have a lot of misinformation going around about FIP and newer Breeders find themselves with 2-3 litters of FIP kittens that need to get to Rescue as they do not have the resources to treat. Many Veterinarians do not have the current FIP information. We are still working to resolve Feline Purchaser sick cat Complaints.

### **Current Happenings of Committee:**

We have been fortunate to work with Nicole Jacque, CA, who is at the forefront of FIP research and treatment with the new drug, GS-441524. She has written numerous papers with Niels C. Pedersen, DVM PhD, Distinguished Professor Emeritus at U.C. Davis, and dedicates her (spare) time to helping cure FIP+ cats and kittens. Nicole has been gracious and shared her knowledge with our Rescue Partners to teach them about the FIP treatment protocol and

breeders who want her help. Our Rescue Partners will also advise, guide and help any Breeders who want help, including the best places to buy the medications at discount.

We are updating our CFA Web pages and forms. Many of our intake forms had to have changes this year. Put are putting together FIP Contact information for anyone who wants help. Many Breeders and Veterinarians do not have the latest information, and this can help them as well to be able to contact Nicole Jacque with Niels C. Pedersen's Office.

# **Future Projections for Committee:**

Research outside fund raising and grant opportunities. Update Web Page graphics.

Encourage all Breeders to get a kitten/cat they sell microchipped, dual register chip (breeder-purchaser) and note microchip # with Vet Heath Certificate issued. (Required overseas with many feline sales.) It would help with so many issues. AKC uses microchips for many issues like hip certification etc., it is included with the registration. This will help reunite any lost or stolen felines with their Owners.

Researching other Registries and comparing their Guidelines and Standards to our CFA Standards.

Work on adding a valid Feline Health Certificate to our CFA Breeder Code of Ethics that will be acceptable. Many states like Florida have required Health Certificates for decades. A valid Feline Health Certificate (Current/valid as defined by sellers governing entity, signed by a veterinarian, certificate usually valid for 15-30 days).

Submit an update to the CFA Breeder Code of Ethics, our CFA Minimum Cattery Standards and our Cattery Inspection Form to submit to the CFA BOD. CFA has always been a Leader in these areas.

Mastin: Animal Welfare, Pam? I haven't seen Charlene yet. DelaBar: No, I haven't. Mastin: I think she's due in at noon, right? DelaBar: No, you told me – Mastin: I think it was afternoon, so, why don't you do the review of Animal Welfare? DelaBar: I can go through, and I'm sure she's got some points that she definitely wants to emphasize above and beyond this. Mastin: OK. DelaBar: But you saw how busy, especially the Breed Assistance Program has been. As our population ages, we are seeing in some areas some cognitive declines, but not

declines in the number of their cats. They have worked from anywhere from 15 to 60, in one case, 100 cats that needed to be placed because the breeder-owner could no longer take care of these animals. They have worked on four animal control cases. What happens, these are what we called civil process seizures, and that's when, for whatever reason, animal control comes in, takes the cats. In these cases, they didn't know about CFA's programs, and Charlene and her group were able to really educate them. They received lots of really good feelings from the authorities because of how CFA helped. They've handled approximately 472 cats. They've also been working with litters of FIP kittens and cats, in treating them and overcoming FIP. These are our volunteers that are working on this. They get the sick cat complaints that they follow up on. There's going to be an update on the site on the FIP, giving contact information. The group is also researching the fundraising and grant writing opportunities, because this is an expensive proposition. So again, we're asking for any kind of donations to the Breeder Assistance Program, and to help in these cases. It also works in well with our legislative efforts, because if we show that we're part of the solution rather than just being a problem, it really helps our standing, especially in local communities. Again, I'm going to say, and this is going to be going with Marilee's program, I know – please microchip your cats. If you take them in for a regular veterinary appointment, it doesn't cost that much to microchip. Those of us that have to do it mandatorily, it's just part of the life of being a breeder. Health certificates, at least in the state that we're in right now, it's required if you sell or transfer a cat. Again, these are things that happen in other parts of the world that become part of life. There are actions now at the World Cat Congress level that we're going to be seeing that address not only the legislative aspects of these, but also the health and welfare aspects.

**DelaBar:** There's no motions or action items at this time, but if you have questions, I would be happy to take them. Mastin: I know on the report, it's listed as an action item. I did reach out to Charlene earlier in the week, and she did say that it belonged under future projections, and it was her error when she put it there. As Pam said, no action items at this time. Does anybody have any questions for Pam? **DelaBar:** One other thing, as you know, we had a very prominent person in Europe have some extreme medical difficulties. Again, the cat fancy stepped in, first with the Breeder Assistance Program, on getting her six cats taken care of in a commercial type facility. [phone rings] Ah-ha. Kathy is coming over. Calhoun: Can you write me a check? Bennett: I set an alarm so I wouldn't be late, because Rachel told me 11:10. Mastin: We do not accept excuses. Notice is posted for all in the audience. It will be posted outside the room tomorrow, as well. We encourage you to turn them all on because Kathy wants money. Turn them all on. Newkirk: That's called deficit reduction. DelaBar: I do want you to know where that originated. Mastin: Tell us. We're ahead of schedule. Tell us. DelaBar: When I was president, Kathy was sitting there just taking in the dollars. **Mastin:** Continue, Pam. **DelaBar:** One of our well-known fanciers was able to take in the cats, and we are supplementing any veterinary costs there. On two different fronts, we have supported our own. Mastin: OK, great. Pam, anything else? DelaBar: That's it. Mastin: Alright. Thank you very much.

[From end of open session] **DelaBar:** You said that since Charlene came in, you wanted to see if she had anything added to the report. **Mastin:** Yes, yes, yes. Charlene, do you have anything you want to add in addition to your report? Pam reviewed it earlier. Was there anything you want to talk about? **Campbell:** Well, I did come prepared with a speech. **Mastin:** Well, come on up here. Allene, can Charlene sit in between the two of you so she doesn't have to walk all the way up here? **Tartaglia:** Sure. Well, here, why don't you just sit here? **Mastin:** Pam,

thank you for bringing that up. **DelaBar:** I may be old, but my mind has not gone. **Mastin:** Pam, you're not old, you're just getting older.

Campbell: Good morning, everyone. Good morning board members and delegates. I'm Charlene Campbell and the vice-president and the Breeder Assistance Chair on the CFA Animal Welfare team and I would like to give you a look into the Breeder Assistance and Breed Rescue work that we do day in and day out, year round. We are an organization of volunteers. We depend on your donations to continue our work. 98.35% of your contributions goes to assisting CFA cats, and the 1.65% remainder goes to insurance and government filings. Many thanks to all who have donated to the Breeder Assistance Program and the Breed Rescue Program over this and the past years, and to the board for your generous donations that enable us to continue our service.

Campbell: So, maybe you wonder what we do. We assist when breeders need help. It may be providing food and litter in times of need, such as the aftermath of hurricanes, fires or loss of income, or breeder illness or disability. Just an example, we did provide, with the help of CFA, to everyone that was devastated by the back-to-back hurricanes. We also assist overwhelmed or incapacitated breeders to downsize their catteries so that they may stay in CFA with a limited amount of cats, and we respond to assist when breeders are contacted by animal control to rescue and place CFA cats, so they don't go into an animal control shelter, because they do not fare well there. This year, we helped with rescues, downsizing quite a number of catteries – many catteries with 50-60 felines and one cattery with 100 felines to downsize. Fortunately, many of the cats were healthy and their living space was well maintained on the 100. It took us 9 months to move those cats out because they were in California, and as you know there were fires. With all the overwhelmed rescues, we were actually transporting them around the country. Sadly, some situations were so sad that none of us would want to see. In the past, Breeder Assistance and Breed Rescue provided rescue services for our animal control cases. Animal control did not know about the Breeder Assistance Program and was glad to work with our program to help cats go to fosters who understand pedigreed cats, and could help get some of them back to co-owners. We have dealt with situations with breeders experiencing dementia. That's one of the harder ones, which needs gentle help to surrender cats in one situation where the breeder's family actually called animal control, not knowing what else to do, because they were not aware of Breeder Assistance. So, we were able to step in and help bring those cats into our Program.

Campbell: In the past season, we assisted longhair Selkirks, Ragdolls, British Shorthairs, American Shorthairs, Persians, Tonkinese, Siamese, Ocicats, Bengals, Balinese, Egyptian Maus, Maine Coons, Birmans – all CFA cats. We assisted 472 surrendered cats that needed future care. When cats are taken in by our foster partners, they are vet checked, tested, treated as needed when they have a positive diagnosis. Our foster partners assure that they receive excellent care until they are adopted by appropriate families. Many of these cats that come from catteries that have fallen through the cracks are very sick. They can stay in the rescue from 6 to 8 months until they are rehabilitated, to be able to go to a proper home. We treated 74 cats and kittens with FIP through our fabulous rescue partners. Some of these cats and kittens came to us with 2 or 3 litters of kittens with FIP. Thanks to starting treatment quickly, only one did not survive. We're going to have a hand-out with FIP because there's a non-profit place for breeders to buy their medications which is less expensive. We are fortunate to work with Nicole Jacques, who is at the

forefront of the FIP research, and worked with Niels Pedersen, M.D., from UC-Davis. He spends his spare time working with rescue partners to teach them about FIP treatment protocol with the newest drug, the GS-411524. Thanks to her support, our rescue partners are up to date on FIP treatment and protocols, and are ready to help any breeder that gets overwhelmed with FIP kittens. They don't have to die. We can take them. Breed Assistance can help with information about the treatment protocols, the best places to buy medications, recommendations for your vet at a discount. So, if you have a breeder and they are unsure what to do, our fosters will actually hold their hands through the full 84 day process and help guide them along all the way through.

Campbell: Any of us may need help at some point. CFA Breeder Assistance and Breed Rescue, with your donations and help, is here to assist when life is so difficult that you need to think about asking for help. We are here to help CFA cats and their people with care and confidentiality. We breeders and exhibitors are a proud crew. You can be sure that we will help in complete confidentiality. # **Brief Summation of Immediate Past Committee Activities:**

The committee reported the following at the April 2025 board meeting. Additional updates are included below.

1. Work continues with the IT department to develop an electronic version of the catalog with a link that can be sent to exhibitors. To date, we have nothing in the show rules concerning electronic catalogs. While work continues with the IT department, the committee is identifying possible show rules to be changed/added to allow for distribution of electronic catalogs. All these details are being worked on with a roll out proposed for the first quarter of the 2025-2026 show season.

Dynamic Edge has finished the electronic catalog and the committee members who are also entry clerks are currently reviewing and testing the electronic catalog. We are pushing the rollout date back to the second quarter of the 2025-2026 show season, so the committee has time to work with the show rules committee on needed additions/changes to the show rules. This work is in conjunction with the entry clerking program enhancement committee.

2. The committee met to discuss what possible paperwork could be reduced in the show hall. NCR paper is getting harder to find and is very costly to purchase so the discussion centered around moving to one-part paperwork in the show hall, which means a substantial saving in supply costs and shipping fees. The meeting was very productive with great feedback from the judging program committee about the pros and cons of such a big move. The committee realizes this is a huge change for many and we are beta testing the use of one-part paper at three separate shows, in April, involving three judges from each show. We will be asking the clubs, judges, ring clerks, and master clerks involved to provide comments (pro and con) back to the committee for continued planning and process refinement for a proposed roll out during the second quarter of the 2025-2026 show season (August 1, 2025). Letters have been sent to the clubs, judges, and master clerks concerning the beta test. The committee looks forward to working with everyone and receiving their feedback.

All clubs, judges, master clerks, and entry clerks asked to participate in the beta test accepted the challenge. The committee would like to thank the following clubs and individuals for participating.

We would also like to thank Jan Rogers, Bethany Colilla and central office. Jan asked to try the one-part paper in addition to the judges in the beta test and Bethany experienced the one-part paper when her judges' book was printed backwards at a show. Also, a show in China did not receive their show package and had to use one-part paper for their show. Central office was a great help in determining all the forms that could be reduced to one-part for the show hall. The committee feels the test was a success with very positive comments from all involved. We are confident the judges will make the transition with minimal impact on their routine in the ring. This committee chair has been invited to the judge's workshop to talk about the process and answer any questions. I look forward to a lively discussion with our judges.

We have worked with the show rules committee on the affected show rules. Those changes will be presented for the board's approval during the show rules committee report.

3. The committee also discussed what technology could be used in the show hall. Again, there was a very productive discussion. We talked about a two-phase process; the first phase would have minimal cost and high impact for central office. This would include developing a data file, to be used with or without Wi-Fi, so that master clerks could enter information about finals and breed summaries which would be uploaded to central office when Wi-Fi was available. This would be the most beneficial to central office because it would allow central office to upload the data into the scoring software after a verification process is completed, which would reduce/eliminate the need for central office staff to do data entry.

Gavin Cao has done some preliminary programming that looks very promising. Gavin is working with James Simbro and Cathy Dunham to continue to refine the data needed. This project will be beta tested in the first quarter and with a proposed roll out for the second quarter of the 2025-2026 show season.

The second phase would be a high cost with a smaller impact on central office but a huge impact on the show hall. It would include the development of an entirely paperless system used in the show hall. Tablets for the judges, ring clerks, and master clerks and all information submitted directly to central office. This is something to dream about, for now, while we are working on phase one.

This project has been pushed back to the second quarter of the 2025-2026 show season so the show rules and programming can be finished.

Due to a personal issue of my own, I was the entry clerk for the Midwest regional show this past weekend, and I was unable to provide the multi-part paper to the judges as I would normally do. I did let all the judges know that, and so they all graciously took on the challenge of using one-part paper throughout the entire show. Now, a majority of those judges had already been part of the beta test that I talk about in the report, but there were judges that had not experienced it that took the challenge on, and I think handled it very graciously. So, that's the only update to this report I have. If you have any questions, let me know. Mastin: Questions? No questions.

### **Brief Summation of Immediate Past Committee Activities:**

Work continues with the IT department and the show technology committee to develop an electronic version of the catalog with a link that can be sent to exhibitors. It has been agreed upon to push the rollout date back to the second quarter of the 2025-2026 show season, so the committees have time to work with the show rules committee on needed additions/changes to the show rules for electronic exhibitor catalogs.

With the new show rules effective May 19, 2025 concerning all kittens must have a registration number or TRN to enter a show, the committee worked with the IT department to add additional checks and balances to the on-line entry form and the entry clerking program. The changes now alert exhibitors and entry clerks that a registration number or TRN are required to enter a kitten in a show.

The committee continues to review the program for areas of improvement. To help our entry clerks we are consulting with the IT department to determine if entries can be added to the entry clerking program in bulk instead of individually.

**Dunham:** The second report is the Entry Clerking Program Enhancement Committee report. Really, I have nothing to add to the report, so if you have any questions, I'm happy to address them.

Mastin: Questions? Darrell. Newkirk: So, can you explain to me, and all of us, why is there a discrepancy between online and breed summaries? How can those numbers not align with one another? **Dunham:** Happy to address that. Typically, what happens is, entry clerks receive the entries into a database. That database is what calculates the online tally. So, it's just kitten entry comes in, it gets put in the kitten tally, championship comes in. What happens, though, is when I, as an entry clerk, look at the particular entry, it may be the wrong category. So, they may enter the cat as a kitten because the exhibitor thinks it's a kitten, but when I put it in the system because of the birth date of the animal, it's really an open in championship or an open in premiership or whatever. So, that does not translate to the tally, but it gets put in the breed summary correctly because I actually entered a cat correctly in the right category. So, that's one way a discrepancy can happen. Another way is, exhibitors get anxious about hitting the submit button on the online entry form and they might hit it a couple of times because they don't think it's going through fast enough and they're in a hurry and they're concerned about the closing deadline. So, it generates what we call "duplicate entries." So, I obviously am not going to put the cat in twice. The system won't let me do that. So, again, there could be a discrepancy because there's two entries in a tally, but I'm only processing one of them and I mark the second one as a duplicate entry. The third way something could be out of sync is, entry clerks ask exhibitors that are doing substitutions of animals to actually submit the entry for the substitution through the online system and put a – there's comments and they say, "I'm substituting A cat for B cat," you know, or whatever. So, those go into the tally, but they're not really an additional entry. We're just substituting cats in and out. So, those are the three main ways that a tally can be different than a breed summary. Newkirk: I've got two follow-up questions. So, once they submit an online entry, it's entered in that database and it's not taken out. So, it's there. OK. Is there a scenario where the online count would be less than the breed summary? **Dunham:** Less than the breed summary? You just should not be unless there's a manipulation that's going on that – Altschul: She just stated a time where it could, if somebody tries to enter one as a kitten and then she has to move it into championship. **Dunham:** Well, that's true. **Altschul:** And additionally, the show last weekend, somebody entered a cat in championship and when they got to the show, they went, "oops, it's actually a premier," so, it made the premier count at the show actually higher than even what the breed summary showed because they entered it the wrong class. So, those kinds of things would cause a discrepancy where someone did use the online entry form correctly, but they entered the wrong class. **Dunham:** Yes, and it happens. It happens. I'm not going to say that I'm not infallible as an entry clerk and I selected the wrong category and the cat went into it. I mean, it happens. Entry clerks are human, too. We make mistakes. That's why we ask you to check the confirmation. Newkirk: So, if a cat is entered with the online system and there's an error and even if you correct it, that would add another tick to the online count. **Dunham:** No. If the original entry came in in the scenario of a cat being in the wrong category, the entry is going to come in in the original category. So, if a cat was entered by the exhibitor as a kitten, it's always going to stay in the kitten tally no matter what I do on the breed summary side. So, then if I correct it and put it in championship, for example, where it's supposed to go, then the breed summary will have an extra cat in championship, but the tally will not because I'm not changing the original entry. That's staying in the database as it was submitted by the exhibitor. **Newkirk:** So, what happens when a show has an entry limit of say 90 or 100 and they get 130 entries through the online system? **Dunham:** OK, so entry clerks that have that scenario happen, they can shut the entry form down manually if we need to and that's a decision that's made by the club, not really the entry clerk. So, in that scenario, I would go to you, Darrell, and

say, "hey, Las Vegas Cat Club, I've reached your entry limit. What do you want me to do? Do you want me to take a waiting list, which means I would leave the entries open and they can still come in, but I know where I hit my limit in the software, or do you want me to close that form down so no more entries can come in and we're not taking substitutions, we're not doing anything. This is what the count is, this is it, we're done." That's a decision the club would have to make and then I would abide by that. If we leave entries open in that scenario, then somebody could say to me, Exhibitor A could say, "hey, I can no longer show the cat I entered, can I substitute a cat?", and I will say, "I'll take your substitution, but I have to have another cat to do that." You know, I won't take a cat out unless I have a cat to put in when I've reached an entry limit. That's the general policy that the entry clerks have used in the past. Newkirk: OK, so we have cutoff times for entries. Dunham: Yes. Newkirk: OK, so how can an entry clerk, once the online system is shut down taking entries, can an entry clerk go in and add cats? **Dunham:** Well, the system will allow you to do that. It's a two-part system, and I think that's where people are getting confused. The online entry form that an exhibitor submits their entry through, that's the process that cuts off at a designated day and time. But, as an entry clerk, I may not get all those entries in at that designated day and time if I'm not sitting right on top of it. OK, so then I might work the next day and enter cats in the entry clerking program from that database, which I can do, and I still have other work to do for the club in the system. Newkirk: So, I understand that, but if a cat is not in that database, are they able to enter a cat outside when they were supposed to put it in the online entry? **Dunham:** Yes. The technical answer is yes. The policy is no. And I'm just being honest. Newkirk: Well, I mean, we're having issues. Dunham: I understand. Newkirk: And so I'm trying to clarify this in my mind so I know how to respond. Dunham: Once that day and time is hit, no additional entry should be accepted once the online system closes. Now, you know, is there a scenario where I might take a substitution of a cat after the closing date and time? Maybe, you know, but it would have to be a pretty good excuse from the exhibitor. And I mean, pretty substantial for me to do that. Otherwise, when that day and time comes, I'm done taking entries other than what's in the database and putting it in the show. Newkirk: So, in the ID, we have an issue with – I'm checking to make sure that the online link is on the show flyer for people to enter those cats in their show, but things are hard to change because they have entered by email and they have entered by WeChat for years, and so it's a slow process trying to get these people – I mean, I have posted it a dozen times. **Dunham:** And I appreciate that. Newkirk: You have to enter online. So, I just want to make sure that I understand the process so that I know that people are cheating. **Dunham:** Absolutely, and I'm happy to join your I/O group for questions. I'm happy to be on any Zoom meetings you want. I mean, I'll do whatever I can to help you do the education, because that not only helps them, but it helps us in Central Office when the show packets actually come in. Mastin: All set, Darrell? Newkirk: Thank you. Yeah, I'm set. Mastin: Thank you. Carol, you had your hand up earlier. Krzanowski: Carissa made the comments that I intended to make. Mastin: Marilee? Griswold: Is there any way to know if an entry clerk is entering entries that have not come from online? **Dunham:** There is. It would be something that that someone would have to request the data, the backside data, from the entry clerking software so that we could match up when those entries were actually entered into the system. Griswold: So, you can compare the online entry counts to the breed summary count? You can tell? **Dunham:** I can match that. The data from the entry clerking program, I can match to what was actually in the entry database. So, I can match them up and see what was in the database at the time it closed versus what was entered in the system. That's how some of the previous discussions took place and how that research happened.

**Griswold:** So, the online entry count we see here, it doesn't have any cat information, obviously, but all of that is in your system somewhere if we need to go check and we can actually compare this entry, was it in the database. **Dunham:** Yes. Somebody just has to request that and I can work with James to have that data pulled.

Mastin: Vicki? Jensen: I have a question. You said that, you know, an example of when somebody enters a cat as a kitten, that it's really an open and you're doing a substitution. Dunham: No, it's not a substitution. Jensen: Well, that's right. When you do that, you know, put that cat in, are you going in and entering it through the online system again or not? **Dunham:** No. It's the original entry, but in that example, based on the birthdate of the cat, the system won't let me enter it as a kitten if it's eight months old. It just won't let me do that. So, then I have to determine if it's an open in championship or an open and premiership. Sometimes that's an email back to the exhibitor saying, is the cat spayed, neutered or whole, or I enter it as I think it should be and when I send the confirmation back in the email, I say, "please check your confirmation carefully because there was a birthdate discrepancy and I have entered it as such and such." Jensen: So the cat's not showing up twice? Dunham: No. Jensen: My other question, and I don't know if it's a question for you or for James, on the show entry online thing, you know, when you look at it, it has, Note, these counts represent only entries submitted via the online form. They do not include entries that may have been submitted to the entry clerk in any other manner, such as regional or club online entry form, fax, postal, mail, etc. I mean, if we're only accepting online entries, shouldn't we be deleting that note? Dunham: Well, we can delete the note, but I will say this. I personally, as an entry clerk, have not had it happen for a while, but I used to get email entries from especially exhibitors that were not technologically advanced and they were having trouble with the online system, and if I got that email, I went in and I put it through the online system. I have that ability. I mean, I can go in and do that anywhere. Jensen: No, but do you see how that might make people think that it's acceptable to send them in by fax? I mean, having that out there. Dunham: Yeah, it's just, that was the language that was out there to begin with because we were still accepting email entries and faxes at some point in time. But yeah, we can take it out. That's not a problem. Mastin: Vicki, thank you. Carol?

Krzanowski: Yes, I did have a question regarding substitutions and how those are handled. If the online entry system has been shut down, either by their prescribed date in time or before if the show is filled, how are substitutions handled after that point? If they cannot enter through the online system, do they send it to you via email? Dunham: They can, but I very seldom take them that way because I want it documented in the database that an entry came in. That's me personally as an entry clerk. Now, other entry clerks may take them via email and they may go ahead and do the substitutions, but the general policy is we don't do it after the date that's closed. Krzanowski: I understand, but if the show should happen to close earlier than the prescribed date, and they want to make the substitution. Dunham: That's a decision for the club to make. Krzanowski: And then entries would be accepted via email? Dunham: Yeah, probably. But I will say most clubs, if they hit their entry limit early, they will leave entries open until the actual true Monday at 11:59, so that we have the ability to take those. Krzanowski: OK. Dunham: So, it's a club decision, but very seldom do they ever close it early. Krzanowski: Thank you.

**Mastin:** Any further questions specific to the Program Enhancements? Do you have any additional comments you need to make, Cathy? Any additional comments on Program Enhancements? **Dunham:** No.

# (17) SHOW RULES COMMITTEE.

**Mastin:** OK, we're going to go on to agenda item #17, Show Rules. Before I turn it over to Ed, Carol, are you a standing motion on all action items? **Krzanowski:** Yes, I am. **Mastin:** I need a second. Kenny, I saw your hand first. You will be the second. Thank you. And Cathy is with us. Thank you. OK, Ed. **Raymond:** First of all, an apology. I really thought we were going to get through a meeting without you hearing from me about show rules, but it wasn't to be.

# **Brief Summation of Immediate Past Committee Activities:**

The Committee was recently asked to investigate the Grand of Distinction (GOD) requirement for a cat in Hawaii for the 2020-2021 show season. SR 28.08 provides that, for cats in Hawaii, 10 finals were required for the 2020-2021 show season to count as a qualifying season, despite there only being two shows, with a total of 8 rings, held in Hawaii that season.

The Committee Chair reviewed all of the board minutes from 2019-2021 to gain an understanding of the COVID-era changes made to SR 28.08 and discovered the following:

10/5/2019 – Board lowered the GOD qualifying season requirement for Hawaii to 10 finals

4/1/2020 – Board reduced the GOD qualifying season requirement for Hawaii to 6 finals for the 2019-2020 show season (20 finals for everyone else)

12/1/2020 – Voting on a motion presented by a special committee of Pam DelaBar and Sharon Roy, the Board approved substitute language for SR 28.08 which, for the 2020-2021 season, reduced the numbers of finals required for Hawaii to 5 (15 for everyone else)

2/6/2021 – Show Rules Committee (Monte) brings forth a show rule change that purports to incorporate the previously passed changes. It restates the non-COVID requirements of 10 finals for Hawaii and 30 for everyone else but states that those requirements are halved for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 show seasons. This brings the requirement for Hawaii down to 5 finals for 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 seasons. Board passes this motion by unanimous consent.

3/16/2021 – Central Office brings motion requesting clarification of the 2019-2020 requirement – 20 finals as passed on 4/1/2020 OR 15 finals as passed on 2/6/2021. Board takes position that 20 finals was the requirement for 2019-2020 and fails motion to reduce to 15 rings. No mention of Hawaii is made but, based on the foregoing, it is assumed that the Hawaii requirement for 2019-2020 remained at six.

4/20/2021 – Board passes motion to continue the 2020-2021 requirements for GOD for the 2021-2022 season.

10/2/2021 – Show Rules Committee report (Monte) includes a show rule change which purports to effectuate the change approved at the April 20, 2021 meeting and which brings SR 28.08 to its current language. However, the actual language of the show rule change was not voted on because the belief was that the change has been approved at the previous board meeting.

Phillips: #5 I don't know if you need to vote on it. It was already voted on basically in April of this year. It's the Grand of Distinction requirements for the 2021-2022 show season. The decision back then was to make them the same as they were for the 2020-2021 season. That's what this does. There's two rules associated with Grand of Distinction; one for Household Pets, one for everybody else. Newkirk: And they have already been amended. Is that correct, Monte? Phillips: Correct. Newkirk: So I don't think we need to vote on it. Phillips: No. I think it has already been passed. We're done with that one. Newkirk: Yes, let's go to the next one.

Unfortunately, the language which this "motion" amended was NOT the language that the Board approved on 2/6/2021. Instead, it seems to amend a prior version of the show rule which leaves out the 5 finals requirement for Hawaii for 2020-2021 and 2021-2022.

The Committee has prepared the show rule change set forth below for the Board's consideration to reflect how SR 28.08 should read, based on the Board's prior votes.

If this change passes, the cat on whose behalf the question was raised, Samwell Tarly, will achieve GOD status because it made 6 finals in the 2020-2021 show season, thereby giving the cat three (3) qualifying seasons. Given the reduced requirements for qualifying seasons in Hawaii for 2020-2021 and 2021-2022, Central Office will need to review its records to see if other cats in Hawaii also achieved qualifying seasons in 2020-2021 and 2021-2022.

### **Board Action Item:**

1. Amend Show Rule 28.08 retroactive to May 1, 2020, to correct the number of finals required for a qualifying GOD season in Hawaii for the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 show seasons.

title. Nine of the ten finals must be Allbreed rings. These finals may be achieved championship or premiership class, combination, in each season. Exception for ring requirements also to be made for the 2019-2020, 2020-2021, and 2021-2022 show seasons. For the 2019-2020 show season, the requirement for finals is 20, except for Hawaii, where the requirement is six. For the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 show seasons, the requirements for finals is 15 total rings, except for Hawaii where the requirement is five. For the 2019-2020, 2020-2021, and 2021-2022 show seasons, there is no requirement that any final be achieved in a particular type of ring (allbreed or specialty). For a final to count toward this award, there must be at least two cats in that final. The "of distinction" suffix will be added to the title corresponding to the class in which the cat competed in the third season with the requisite finals. Cats who have achieved this title will still compete in the regular Grand Champion/Grand Premier classes. This title will be automatically added to a cat's record once the requirements have been met.

**Raymond:** The first item that we have was a request that came from Howard to look at the Grand of Distinction requirements for a cat in Hawaii for the 2020-2021 show season. The show rule requirement for that show season for Grand of Distinction in Hawaii required a cat to achieve more finals than there were rings in Hawaii. Where is Howard? Mastin: I don't know. I think he stepped out. Raymond: I went through and did some research and went through the board minutes from 1999 through 2021, and the Grand of Distinction requirements changed a number of times, but the final version that is currently in the show rule came before the board in 2021, and there was a belief that the language had already been approved in prior board meetings, and therefore it wasn't voted on the actual language of the show rule. It turns out that language that was proposed and is currently in the show rules omitted the exception for Hawaii for a lower Grand of Distinction requirement for two seasons. So, going back, I presented to you as item #1 an amended show rule to correct the number of finals required for qualifying Grand of Distinction season in Hawaii for 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 show seasons. If you pass this, the cat in question that prompted this evaluation will achieve a Grand of Distinction based on that season, and Central Office will need to take a look at other cats in Hawaii to see if they also might have any other cats that might have achieved a Grand of Distinction because of this change.

**Mastin:** Questions? Any discussion? I wish Howard was here, because he was — Vicki? **Jensen:** So, this is about a cat from four years ago? **Raymond:** It's about that. So, Grand of Distinction requires that to achieve a certain number of finals in each season over a three-season period, and those three seasons do not need to be consecutive. **Jensen:** Is there a reason that this wasn't brought up before? **Raymond:** No idea. **Mastin:** I don't think it was discovered until

recently. I don't know. That's why it wasn't brought up before. I'm going to make a recommendation that we table this until Howard comes back in the room. **Jensen:** OK. **Calhoun:** He's coming. **Mastin:** Is there a fee if you don't return to the meeting in time, Kathy? **Calhoun:** It wasn't pre-noticed. **Mastin:** You might want to think about that. Sorry Vicki, I don't have all the answers. This came to us from Howard. **Calhoun:** He's coming. **Jensen:** So should we skip it until he comes back? **Mastin:** Yeah, let's table. Carol, are you OK tabling this? **Krzanowski:** Yes. **Mastin:** Kenny, you OK? **Currle:** No problem. [Transcript goes to Item #2]

Mastin: Howard, welcome back to the meeting. We tabled the first item. Kathy is working on a fee for you not being here on time. She'll get with you later in the day. Webster: Sorry, folks. Mastin: There are questions. There is a question on this first action item. It came from Vicki. So, Vicki, go ahead and ask your question. Jensen: Oh, well, my first question was, this is about a cat from four years ago. And my second question was, is there a reason this wasn't brought up four years ago? Webster: I don't know why that wasn't. It was just brought to my attention this year, and they asked. Mastin: Is it a cat from four years ago? Webster: Yeah, it was almost finished when they hit the three-year mark, or the pandemic. Mastin: OK. And you don't know the answer to the other question. Cathy Dunham, do you know, maybe? Dunham: I think I do. The cat in question had two seasons before the pandemic, one of which is the season that the information was omitted from the show rule. The third season the cat just completed, but when we looked at the cat, it appeared that it needed X number more finals to complete and the owner brought it to our attention that the show rule was inaccurate. Howard was informed of that and we're just trying to correct the show rule on what it should be for all seasons so that this cat can go ahead and be a Grand of Distinction and we'll review any other cats that fall into that category. Mastin: Great. Thank you, Cathy. Darrell? Newkirk: So several years ago, maybe just before the pandemic, Donna Fujie, I was judging one of her shows, and she is the one that informed me that there was an impossibility for a cat from Hawaii to reach its Grand of Distinction because the number required was more than the number of total rings they had in Hawaii. They have three shows and there's usually four rings, occasionally five. I think last year they had four shows. So, I brought this to the board a long time ago and I thought it was all taken care of but apparently something was missing or overlooked. You know, these things happen, as they say, so we're doing the right thing here. It doesn't matter when it's brought to the board. It's an issue. There was a mistake. We need to correct it and so I'm fully supportive of this. Mastin: Thank you, Darrell. Is there any further discussion? Are there any objections? Seeing no objection, motion passes unanimously.

All you have to do is take it in and get it scanned and send us the link. **Nasin:** OK. And then on using the CFA, maybe they can give discounts. I don't know how to look into it. **Dunham:** I can send you the scanning instructions. It tells you who to send the package to. **Nasin:** OK. Alright. Thank you. # **Brief Summation of Past Activities:**

The World Cat Congress (WCC) will be hosted by the Hong Kong Black Cat Club. The WCC business meeting will be held on 31 July and a free seminar for attendees, breeders/exhibitors and sponsors will be conducted 1 August. A CFA show will be held on 2-3 August in conjunction with the Hong Kong Cat Expo (a huge event) in the Hong Kong Convention Center.

On 31May, CFA Board Members received a copy of the CFA proposal to the WCC to establish a working committee to fight restrictive breed and breeder laws. This was done in partnership with TICA and a collaboration between the TICA Attorney and the CFA Delegate.

#### **Current Happenings of the Committee:**

All judges for the 10 ring show have been contracted: there will be 6 CFA judges and 4 guest judges, one each from TICA, FIFe, World Cat Federation, and the Southern African Cat Council. As part of the seminar, the associations do get up and say what has happened significantly in their associations during the year and can take questions. So, there's a lot of audience and advisor-delegate interaction. Plus, we have Marilee that's giving a report and it appears Leslie Lyons was not available. She has a family function. So, it appears we will possibly be having me fill in, especially for Royal Canin who cannot attend this year. Royal Canin is the sponsor of the World Cat Congress. On Saturday and Sunday will be the show, five rings each day. We have six CFA judges and we have a judge from FIFe. We have a judge from WCF. We have a judge from TICA and one from the Southern African Cat Council who judged for us at the Las Vegas WCC event. So, any questions? And Kathy, we're keeping things really, really low on budget. Calhoun: I'm tracking it. Mathis: You knew she was. DelaBar: I knew. Mastin: Can you tell us the names of the six CFA judges? DelaBar: Sure. Hang on just a second. I've just got to find the right papers. Darrell is one, Allan Raymond is one, Rachel is one, I'm one, Marilee, Suki Lee Wong. Mastin: OK, great. Thank you. Does anybody else have any questions? No action items. DelaBar: No action items. OK. Rachel, do you have any additional comments? Anger: No. Pam did a great job. Mastin: Thank you, Pam. DelaBar: You're welcome.

#### **Unfinished Business and General Orders**

#### (21) <u>UNFINISHED BUSINESS.</u>

**Mastin:** Rachel, do you have Unfinished Business and General Orders? **Anger:** We have no items under Unfinished Business.

[Secretary's Note: The following discussion originally occurred in executive session. A motion was made by Mr. Newkirk, seconded by Ms. DelaBar and unanimously carried to move the report and vote into open session with no debate or discussion.]

#### (a) Show Scheduling Objections.

BACKGROUND: At the June 11, 2025 teleconference, a discussion was had regarding the Great Lakes Region holding a 2 day (back to back) 8 ring show, the second weekend in February (February 14/15, 2026) in Columbus, Ohio. The Region would like to use this weekend as a fundraising show and a traditional date. The motion was amended to eliminate the request for a traditional date, as the request violates various Show Rules. The show request was published in the CFA News on June 6, 2025, with comments open until June 13. The motion was amended, a vote was taken and the motion failed.

**MOTION:** Approval show date request for the Great Lakes Region to have a traditional date the second weekend in February, commencing February 14/15, 2026. Colilla, DelaBar and Webster voting yes. Jensen abstained.

Therefore, the Show Scheduling Committee will or has likely approved the date. In accordance with the Show Scheduling guidelines (www.cfa.org/regional-show-schedulers/), Regional Directors and clubs have the right to take scheduling disputes to the CFA Board for final resolution. Region 7 objects and is taking its objection to the board for a ruling.

**RATIONALE:** The show will impact all shows in CFA. To allow its occurrence will severely impact Region 7's club's planned show in Newport News, Va.

**MOTION:** Due to Region 7's objection to the Great Lakes Region holding a 2 day (back to back) 8 ring show, the second weekend in February (February 14/15, 2026) in Columbus, Ohio, deny the request which was submitted to the Show Scheduling Committee.

Mastin called the motion. Tie Vote. President Mastin broke the tie by voting no. Motion Failed. Altschul, Anger, Currle, Griswold, Nasin, Newkirk, Tamura and Webb voting yes.

# (22) OTHER COMMITTEES.

Anger: We have no items under Other Committees. We made up for it in New Business.

#### (23) <u>NEW BUSINESS.</u>

**Mastin:** OK, so we've got New Business, right? **Anger:** Yes. **Mastin:** Alright. What do we have under New Business?

#### (a) Three One-Day Shows in the Same Location.

**BACKGROUND:** Three clubs would like to hold a Friday/Saturday/Sunday event on September 25-27, 2026 in Orange, France (Region 9). They are requesting an exception to Show Rule 4.06.a.3. to allow three one-day shows in the same location, each with a format of 5 AB/1 SP. All three clubs hosting the shows are CFA: Orange Cat Club, Universal Cats Club, and UK Cat Fanciers. Exhibitors can enter 1, 2, or all 3 of the shows.

This 3-day format is being used by other organizations in Europe and is gaining in popularity—and entries. There have been 3-day shows in the US, though most were champion/premier rings on Friday with the remainder of rings on Saturday and Sunday, and were sponsored by the same club.

Anger: The first one is Pam DelaBar's action items on the three one-day shows in the same location. **DelaBar:** It's not coming up on the finalized thing I have here. **Anger:** It's there in the compiled reports. **DelaBar:** Let me go back in and see if I can – **Mathis:** Yeah, here's mine. **DelaBar:** Yes, can I use your iPad? Thank you. We're passing the iPad. **Mathis:** There we go. **DelaBar:** There are some things that were not totally understood, so let me first go to the first motion.

**MOTION:** Grant the Orange Cat Club, Universal Cats Club, and UK Cat Fanciers an exception to Show Rule 4.06.a.3 and allow three one-day shows in the same location, each consisting of 5 AB/1 SP, on September 25-27, 2026 in Orange, France (Region 9).

3. Two one-day shows in the same location consisting of up to six rings held on the first day and up to six rings held on the second day with an entry limit of 225 cats. This format will permit up to six judgings per entry each day. To be licensed, the shows are required to have one specialty ring for both longhair and shorthair specialties in kittens, championship, and premiership. The specialty rings can be divided between the two shows (one each show) or held on one day with no specialty rings on the other day. The use of Super Specialty rings will not meet the requirement for specialty rings.

**DelaBar:** We have three clubs, and I need to correct, it's not the American Shorthair Lovers of Europe. It's the UK Cat Fanciers Club. Three different clubs putting on shows three different days. Starting on Friday, there will be one club with a six-ring show, five allbreed, one specialty. On Saturday, there will be another club with a six-ring show, five allbreed, one specialty. On Sunday, there will be another club, five allbreed, one specialty. And that's three different show licenses and fees, Kathy. Yeah, something like that. We have been seeing within Europe – in fact, one of the independent clubs that we have accepted to work with their pedigrees and allow myself to judge for them and Michael Schleissner as well, three-day shows are really coming into play with different organizations. We had the concept before, years ago, and it used to be that they would do a special championship and premiership on, like, Fridays and maybe start a little later on Friday afternoon or whatever. But it was truly a three-day show, but it was

sponsored by one club. These are three clubs going together to put on this show. Now, because of the war situation in Russia and Ukraine, we no longer have the elegant Grand Prix that brought in 35,000 spectators and five or six different organizations going together to put on these shows. We don't have that anymore, but we certainly can start the concept coming back in in Central Europe; that being, in Orange, France. So, we are asking – the show rule reads, you know, the clubs we can have two days. I'm asking for the exception to have that as three days so these three clubs can use the same facility and have these shows. Mastin: Rachel? Anger: Second. Mastin: Thank you. Discussion? Ed, do you have any comments or concerns? Raymond: No, no concerns. Mastin: No concerns. Very good. Are there any objections? Seeing no objection, motion passes

The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

\* \* \* \* \*

**BACKGROUND:** CFA Attorney Ed Raymond recommended requesting an exception to Show Rule 4.05. The Show Rules define the permissible formats for which Central Office will issue a license and would be limited to 10 rings unless the board approves an exception.

**MOTION:** Grant an exception to Show Rule 4.05 and allow the Orange Cat Club, Universal Cats Club, and UK Cat Fanciers to allow cats or kittens to be entered in more than 10 rings to be held concurrently on September 25-27, 2026 in Orange, France (Region 9); i.e., 5 AB/1 SP in each of the three shows.

Any club or Regional Director(s) may sponsor any type or number of rings to be held concurrently provided that a cat or kitten may not be entered in more than ten rings all to be held concurrently. When shows are held of a nature that would permit certain cats or kittens to be eligible for entry in more than ten rings, the show committee may so state on the show flyer and entry form in which shows such cats or kittens are to be entered.

**DelaBar:** The second motion is going to be withdrawn because there's nothing concurrent in these shows. This is what I talked to you yesterday about, Ed. There's nothing concurrent. I would like to withdraw the second motion because I don't believe it pertains to the situation. **Mastin:** Very good.

Withdrawn.

\* \* \* \*

**BACKGROUND:** Passion Alliance Feline, a LOOF club, would like to hold an in-conjunction show in the same location as the three-day event in Orange, France on September 25-27, 2026.

On 5 June 2025, the board granted permission for Orange Cat Club to hold an in-conjunction show with this same club/organization for the upcoming Region 9 show and awards banquet September 27-28, 2025. There are no changes to the personnel for either organization and no suspensions.

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**MOTION:** For its three-day show in Orange, France (Region 9) on September 25-27, 2026, grant the Orange Cat Club, Universal Cats Club, and UK Cat Fanciers permission to hold an in-conjunction show with Passion Alliance Feline Club (LOOF), on the condition that the club be informed that they should comply with the Guidelines (and enclose a copy with our approval).

Pam DelaBar, Director CFA Region 9 (Europe)

**DelaBar:** Third motion is to allow Passion Alliance Feline, which is LOOF. If you're not familiar with LOOF, that is a French government registry, that all cats born in France must be registered in LOOF. I wrote the agreement between CFA and LOOF. Michael Schleissner signed. We have a very good relationship, I would say, with LOOF right now. In the Orange area, the LOOF club likes to put on a show the same time we put on shows. There seems to be some migration occasionally, but it's a working relationship I would like to continue. Our regional show, the last weekend of September, will be also held in conjunction with LOOF and that was approved by this board for this very same club and that's what the motion is. It's to allow the inconjunction show. **Mastin:** Do we have a second? Rachel? **Anger:** Second. **Mastin:** Thank you. Discussions? Any objections? Seeing no objections, the motion passes unanimously.

#### The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

**DelaBar:** One other comment, Rich. Last year's annual, we passed a rule that allowed Region 9 people to show into Regions 1 through 7 and be able to earn regional points and vice versa. So, those of you in the U.S. that would love to come over, I can tell you Orange is a wonderful city and you would get wonderful hospitality and the chance to enter one, two, possibly three shows over the same weekend. Thank you.

#### (b) Cattery of Excellence

**Mastin:** Next New Business item. **Anger:** We are skipping section (b), the Cattery of Excellence motions and putting them into executive session.

# (c) Joint Show with Whole Council of the Cat Fancy/WCCF Global Cat Association)

BACKGROUND: Panda (WCCF), Carrie (Angel Fairy Sphynx) and Gavin Cao have had several discussions regarding the upcoming October 25/26, 2025 Qingdao show for CFA, using Jon Lee's NGO license. The requirements for NGOs in Wuhou District, Chengdu, China have become very strict. Their procedures are difficult and take a long time to complete. In order to ensure the smooth progress of the event, the organizers must take every step correctly and avoid any problems. Due to the multi-organizational event, Jon Lee's NGO license was rejected. In addition, Carrie is concentrating on her Judging Program application, so her club is willing to give up the event to another CFA club that has stepped forward.

Given the complexity of organizing this event and the number of details involved, they have mutually agreed that it may be in everyone's best interest to change the hosting club to **Xijing Cat Club** (Tony Chen's club) and to use **Sunny Sun's NGO license** for the show.

**MOTION:** For the in-conjunction show with a WCCF club in Qingdao, China (ID-China), on October 25/26, 2025, substitute the Xijing Cat Club in place of the Angel Fairy Sphynx Club, on the condition that the club be informed that they should comply with the Guidelines (and enclose a copy with our approval).

Anger: So (c) would be the joint show with the WCCF Global Cat Association. I guess I will present this one. Mastin: OK. Mastin: There have been some changes. The board approved CFA having an in-conjunction show with a WCCF group at a big event they're having in Qingdao, China, the end of October. There have been some changes and it's been decided by the planning group that rather than the Angel Fairy Sphynx Club being the CFA host club, that it would move to the Xijing Club, Tony Chen's club, and also, John Lee's NGO did not cover this event because of increased requirements in NGOs and there being a number of international judges coming. So Sunny Sun's NGO license will cover it. So the motion is, [reads]. Mastin: Darrell, will you second? Newkirk: I second. Mastin: Thank you. Darrell, any comments? Newkirk: No. I think this is going to be a good event for us and I've been asked to judge that show. So, anyway, I think things are going to go pretty good. Anger: They will go pretty good. Newkirk: They will. DelaBar: They are going to. Mastin: Discussion? Objections? Hearing no objection, motion passes unanimously.

#### The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

**BACKGROUND:** A question has arisen regarding usage of the CFA logo in connection with the WCCF event. The CFA website directs people to Teresa Keiger if they have logo questions. Currently, the CFA logo is displayed alongside other logos in instances such as the World Cat Congress event. Can the CFA logo appear on promotional flyers and online platforms alongside other affiliated organizations? The organizers are seeking the consent of CFA to ensure that their subsequent publicity will not contain errors.

Most of the organizers' flyers are in Chinese (because they are more targeted at Chinese exhibitors), but they can make an English flyer for CFA. A massive advertising campaign will take place from June to October. There will be many pet shows, government associations, media accounts, TV stations, subway advertisements, and airport advertisements in China to help promote the event together.

#### Event schedule:

- 1. On the evening of October 23, 2025, a Chinese and overseas breeder exchange dinner will be held, and it is planned to invite cattery owners from different organizations to participate, with a total of 200-300 people;
- 2. On October 23, 2025, different organizations will hold shows (the CFA show is scheduled for October 25);
- 3. On October 23, lectures and cat shows will be held at the event site during the day;
- 4. On October 26, the Best of the Best awards and the World Champion competition will be held at the event site. The first place winners from different organizations will enter the World Champion finals, and 10 cats will be selected to receive the world winner title. This is similar to the Moscow grand prix event which CFA participated in, in the past.
  - The WCCF would like to display the CFA logo alongside the logos of other associations who are participating in the event in the days before the in-conjunction show on October 25.
  - The WCCF would like to display the CFA logo at the breeder dinner on October 23.
  - A "cooperation medal" is being struck, to award to sponsors. The WCCF would like to include the CFA logo on the medal.

**MOTION:** For the October 23-26, 2025 event in Qingdao, China (ID-China), allow the CFA logo to be used in the advertising for the event alongside other participants, for the October 23 breeder dinner and included in a "cooperation medal" being struck to award to sponsors.

**Anger:** The second motion has to do with use of the CFA logo. They have a number of events that will be held in connection with this big cat gala. I just want you to know how important they find the participation of CFA to be. They've been wanting to partner with us for quite a long time. This opportunity arose and the board approved it. Thank you very much. Now you've approved the amendment. Part of their advertisement, which is going to be released this weekend, is their hope that they can include the CFA logo in their advertisement, along with the logos of other associations, similar to what we do for the World Cat Congress with the nine associations there. The guidelines for logo usage are a little vague. It just says, talk to Teresa Keiger. They don't know who Teresa Keiger is, unfortunately, but I've laid out here what they're doing and what they want to use our logo in connection with. The first point is, they would like to display CFA alongside the logos of other associations who are participating in the event in the days before our participation on October 25th. The WCCF would like to display the CFA logo at the Breeder Dinner on October 23rd. There's going to be 200 or 300 participants. And then they're also striking a special commemorative medal and they would like to have our logo on this medal. It's going to be a big medal. So, I think it would be wonderful and help advertise our association, and this is something that they want to do. They're very proud to have us be a part of it. **Mastin:** Is that your motion? **Anger:** That is my motion, [reads]. Newkirk: I would second the motion, but apparently someone on the board thinks that it's a conflict of interest because I'm judging. I don't think my judging has anything to do with - Currle: I'll second the motion. Newkirk: OK. Mastin: Thank you, Kenny. Discussion? Ed, is there something in any

show rule that doesn't allow the CFA logo to be used with specific associations? **Raymond:** No, the only thing in the show rules are some instances where the logo must be used – on rosettes, on show flyers, on catalogs, no. This is just a use of trademark question. **Mastin:** Very good. I just wanted to make sure we didn't have anything in there. Darrell, do you have any comments on this? **Newkirk:** No. **Mastin:** Does anybody else have comments? Rachel? **Anger:** I'll just close it by saying they wanted full disclosure so that everyone knows what they're using our logo for. **Mastin:** Great. Objections? Seeing no objection, motion passes unanimously.

#### The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

**Anger:** Thank you. And I do want to say that this is going to be huge advertising on the level of our CFA international show.

### (d) Japan Region In-Conjunction Show

**Motion:** Grant the Japan Region permission to hold a 6 ring show in conjunction with TICA Japan Region (TICA Asia East Regional Director Hisae Tasaki) in Tokyo, Japan (Region 8) on April 26, 2026, on the condition that the club be informed that they should comply with the Guidelines (and enclose a copy with our approval).

Anger: Our next item in New Business is the Japan region in-conjunction show. Tamura: Yes, we are planning to hold the CFA Japan regional show on April 26, 2026, the very end of the season. The show hall is going to be at Tokyo Bigsite East Hall, and that show hall is huge. That's 7,000 square meters. Huge. Then, we're planning to have an in-conjunction show with TICA, sponsored by Royal Canin. The show area is totally different. TICA and CFA is totally different. But, you know, this is the fifth time in Japan we are holding same shows. We got a lot of visitors came into this show every year. So, you know, we would like to do this show for the very end of April, but it needs approval for this event. Mastin: Aki, what city is this in? Tamura: It was in 2026. Mastin: No, what city? Tamura: It's at Tokyo. Tokyo Bigsite. Mastin: I'm going to open it up for discussion. This is your motion, correct? Tamura: Oh, yes. Mastin: OK. Darrell? Newkirk: I'll second the motion. Mastin: Thank you. Open for discussion. Pauli? Huhtaniemi: You said it's going to be with the TICA. Do we know the TICA clubs and who the members are? Tamura: The TICA region. The Japan TICA region. Huhtaniemi: OK. That's fine. Mastin: Rachel? Anger: I just want to clarify. Pauli reminded me of this the first time I made an in-conjunction motion. We have new requirements now where we have to list the officers and confirm whether or not any of those people are currently under suspension or disciplinary action.

4.08 No member club may hold, sponsor, or manage a cat show in conjunction with one licensed by any other similar organization without the prior approval of the Executive Board, which may impose such conditions as the Board may deem appropriate. (See CFA Bylaws, Article XII). Requests for approval should be submitted to the CFA Secretary prior to the show being licensed and must include the name and association affiliation of the partner club, the names of that club's officers, and pertinent details about the proposed shows. Given that the Board may impose conditions that it deems appropriate, no show license will be issued until Board approval is granted.

**Anger:** So, we will need that information, the specific names. **Tamura:** It's like, you know, the CFA Japan and also the TICA Japan. So, you know, they're not suspended at all. And the TICA

Asia East Regional Director is Hisae Tasaki. She is the director of the TICA region, TICA Japan region. Anger: And when I publish the motion, I'll add those names. But just as a reminder to everyone, when we come forward with in-conjunction shows. DelaBar: Isn't the intent to make sure that we don't have people who are suspended from CFA going over to these other groups who are wanting to do in-conjunction shows with us? Not particularly people who have been died in the wool with their own association established people. I thought that was the original intent of what we were doing. Not to go and check and say, oh gee, they had a punishment from TICA or whatever. That was not our intent. Ours was to make sure that we didn't have CFA people running over to other associations and then subsequently putting on shows. Mastin: You want to speak on that? Anger: No. She's looking at me. Mastin: She was looking at you. Anger: Pauli or Ed would be a much better resource. **Huhtaniemi:** Yeah, I think that the reason we have the rule is that we have some people in CFA who are suspended, maybe lifetime suspension, and they have filed into TICA clubs or something, and we don't want to co-work with them. That's why we are asking this background information. DelaBar: Basically, that's what I said, Pauli. Huhtaniemi: Yeah, a little bit different tone. Mastin: So Pam, you got the answer you're looking for? DelaBar: Yeah. Aki and I talked about it earlier. Mastin: OK. Further discussion? Any objections? Seeing no objection, motion passed unanimously.

# The motion is ratified by unanimous consent.

[Side discussions regarding a phone going off and the related penalty were not transcribed.]

# (e) Importance of Sending a Delegate

**Anger:** Next, we have Ed Raymond with the importance of sending a delegate. **Mastin:** Oh yes. Go ahead, Ed. Raymond: I just wanted to, since this is out on the Facebook broadcast at the moment, I wanted to remind all the clubs out there of the importance of sending a delegate to the annual meeting. Our bylaws require a quorum of at least 50% of the clubs that are entitled to vote. If we don't get 50% tomorrow, we can sit around and talk all day, but we cannot do any business. So, even if your club can't send a club member, name a delegate and then find a proxy. A proxy counts the same as a delegate. So, I just wanted to encourage that participation. It seems like our delegate count is getting smaller each year. Mastin: Carissa? Altschul: How many clubs are eligible and how many delegate forms were sent in? Where are we? Raymond: There are 510 eligible clubs, so the quorum is 255. I do not know how many are checked in. We'll find that out tomorrow. Altschul: How many were registered? Raymond: I do not know. Altschul: You don't know. Mastin: Based on the information I have from Nancy [Dodds] - Kenny, I'll let you speak after I'm done. Currle: I've got something to say. Mastin: OK. Raise your hand, alright? I touched base with Nancy earlier in the week and she told me there's 57% which is why this is on the agenda for this weekend. So, Ed and I have already talked about this. It's extremely important when we do the amendments and resolutions that we maintain a quorum and the number, as Ed said, is 255. Once we do not have a quorum, we are just talking. We're going to talk about the weather. We're going to talk about Disney World and everything else, but it's very important we have a quorum. Does anybody have any other questions for Ed? OK, Kenny? Currle: Are we at the end of our New Business, Rachel? Mastin: I'm not sure. Is anybody else? Anger: This is the last item I had. Mastin: Darrell? Newkirk: I just want to make one comment. For the past several years, I've tried to put delegates from clubs that aren't going to attend with a

proxy. I did three this year. That was it. There are absolutely zero – zero – delegates from Japan. I have talked to Aki about this and those clubs in Japan used to be loyal supporters of us. I would do 20 to 25 proxies for the Japanese clubs. This year, it was zero.

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**Mastin:** Does anybody else have anything for open session? Kenny, do you have something for open session? Currle: Yes. As Regional Director of the Southern Region, I want to welcome personally the board and board members, Central Office employees here today. I want you to enjoy the weekend. I want you to have a really good time. And Rachel, I am going to take your advice. I'm not going to mention the Cat Week show on September 13-14 in Daytona, Florida. We'd love to see you all there. Mastin: Thank you, Kenny. Does anybody else have anything for open session? Allene? Tartaglia: This is from the hotel. We have three people who made reservations who didn't check in last night. I want to see if anybody knows who they are, because they're going to release their rooms. So, if they don't check in tonight, they won't have a room. So the three people are Cheryl Flake, Mark Hendricks, and Doug Welch. Does anybody? Currle: I know Cheryl. I don't know her personally. Tartaglia: Does anybody know what their plans are? Because I'm going to release their rooms. Mastin: Allene, Carissa is going to reach out to two people from her region. Tartaglia: Great. Thank you. Mastin: Can you give us a little time so they can reach out? Tartaglia: Yeah, I'll ask them to give a few minutes. In the meantime, can they roll the lunch in? Mastin: Let's finish up here, and then we'll bring it in, OK? Darrell, you had your hand up. Newkirk: I was going to be a smart ass. I know, such a shock. Currle: Darrell, you don't need to practice. Mastin: We're ahead of schedule, so if you want, you can go ahead. Newkirk: No, I'm just going to thank Kenny for not bringing up his show in September. Currle: September 13th and 14th. In Daytona. Mastin: Anything else for open business?

Mastin: Before we adjourn, I just have a couple of comments to say. First, I want to start out by thanking George Eigenhauser from this board for his many years of service as committee member and Chair of the Protest Committee for 25 years. George has worked with the Legislative Committee as a committee member and Chair for 26 years. I also want to thank Darrell Newkirk, current Director at Large, past president and board member for 17 years.
